HMCS Calgary's ship's company paraded on the flight deck in Makam Bay in Phuket, Thailand, on Wednesday, Sept. 17 as Cdr Bill Quinn assumed command from Cdr Kelly Larkin during a Change of Command Ceremony.

Calgary is continuing their Operation Altair Roto 4 deployment, and Phuket is the first port of call for the crew to decompress after a long mission.

The ship's company mustered smartly in whites and hosted a reception after the auspicious occasion.

The turnout for the parade, both in terms of participants and audience, was impressive. In attendance were: Canada's Ambassador to Thailand, Canada's Defence Attaché in Bangkok, the Governor of Phuket Province, the Mayor of Patong, and several Thai parliamentary representatives and Honorary Consuls. The Royal Thai Navy was also well represented with many high ranking officers in attendance, some travelling from Bangkok specifically for the occasion.

In a moving speech, CommanderLarkinexpressed his pride in the crew and all that had been accomplished by them during his tenure. He highlighted Calgary's accomplishments during Operation Altair and the successes the ship enjoyed as a result of the outstanding spirit inherent in Calgary.

Cmdre Nigel Greenwood, Commander Canadian Fleet Pacific, then addressed the ship's company and lauded Calgary's extraordinary relationship with her host city, and promised a continuation of Calgary's challenging sailing schedule.

After the signing of Change of Command certificates, Commander Larkin was presented with the ship's commissioning pennant proudly displayed in a shadow box. Several other gifts were presented days before while the ship was at sea.

The post-ceremony reception was exceptional with an ice sculpture, artistically decorated cake and many wonderful foods presented on the flight deck. All efforts highlighted the talents of the ship's cooks and stewards.

Sailor ranks fourth in Army Run

During Canada's first Army Run held in Ottawa on Sept. 21, Fleet Diving Unit Pacific clearance diver LS Jonathan Gendron kept a pace to be reckoned with during the half marathon.

Sprinting into fourth place among 2,911 sweat-drenched runners, he broke the ribbon at a phenomenal time of 1:17:7.

LS Gendron admits it was a hard race.

"My goal was 1:17 and the watch on my heart rate monitor wasn't working, so I had no clock to judge my time by. I just ran how I felt, and it worked out," said LS Gendron, who beat his personal record by 2:40 minutes.

"This was the first time my parents saw me run and they were impressed," said the 22-year-old originally from Quebec.

His father's surprise turned to pride at the 20-kilometre mark when LS Gendron sprinted by smiling with other elites runners in the lead. The finish line proved emotional for his mother who witnessed her son's fourth place victory.

LS Gendron found his passion for running while gearing up for the clearance diver course.

"I heard it was a tough physical commitment and wanted to get into shape, so I started running three times a week."

When he took the Fleet Diving Unit physical training test, he broke the record for the 2.4-kilometre run. Urged by his instructor, he began competing in races and found he loved it.

Now running up to 70 kilometres a week, he's literally a running machine.

"There are a couple guys that are faster than me in my running club, which helps me push a bit more," he said.

He holds the base record for the annual physical fitness test 20-metre shuttle run, and his next aspiration is to join the Conseil International du Sport Militaire (CISM), an International sporting competition that is second in size to the Olympics. He will engage the help of Personnel Support Programs staff to realize this dream.

The sailor was one of 10 military runners chosen to participate in the Army Run based on results from the Aug. 17 10-kilometre Navy Run where he finished first among military runners, with a time of 36:10.

Also in the top 10 finishers was Lt(N) Blake Poirier (Joint Task Force Games) with a time of 1:19:06, finishing just minutes behind LS Gendron.

"Running under 1:20 was the main goal for me," said Lt(N) Poirier about his first half marathon.

The Army Run also hosted a five-kilometre race, and with 7,000 participants in both races was the largest turnout in Canadian history for an inaugural race. Registration for next year's Army Run can be found at www.armyrun.ca

This is truly a madcap weekend in theatres with at least six new films opening across the country, including Nick and Norah's Infinite Playlist; the western drama, Appaloosa; the oddball thriller, Blindness; Flash of Genius, starring Greg Kinnear; the comedy, How to Lose Friends & Alienate People; plus Religulous, Rachel Getting Married, and Beverly Hills Chihuahua.

Nick and Norah's Infinite Playlist

In the grand tradition of the classic 80s teen comedies comes Nick and Norah's Infinite Playlist. the story of two strangers thrust together for a night on the town that will have them living large, New York style.

Michael Cera is Nick, a depressed teenager trying to get over losing his girlfriend when he happens to meet Norah, played by Kat Dennings. Trying to prove to his ex-girlfriend that he's moved on, even though he hasn't, Nick asks Norah to pretend they're going out for five minutes, which turns into a night of music, mayhem, and unforgettable moments.

Directed by Peter Sollett, who also brought the incredibly vivid film Raising Victor Vargas to life, Nick and Norah's Infinite Playlist looks like a certifiable hit this weekend.

Appaloosa

One of the critical gems

Festival, Appaloosa stars Ed Harris and Viggo Mortensen in the story of a town that is controlled by the outlaw Randall Bragg, played by perennial bad guy Jeremy Irons. Taking whatever he wants from the surrounding countryside, Randall Bragg has turned the area into a miserable, desperate place, but Virgil Cole and Everett Hitch (played by Harris and Mortensen respectively) are going to try and save the day.

With few westerns to speak of in recent years, Appaloosa seems like both a treat and an oddity among the common genres at local cinemas.

Blindness

Starring Julianne Moore, Blindness is the odd, but somewhat compelling story of a plague that sweeps across a city, rendering everyone blind. Starring Mark Ruffalo, Danny Glover, and Gael García Bernal, the film has Moore playing a woman who pretends that she is infected iust so she can stay with her husband, played by Ruffalo.

Exploring the brutal nature of society, and the beauty, the film has had a lot of buzz since it debut at the Cannes International Film Festival.

Flash of Genius

One of this week's better-reviewed films stars Greg Kinnear as real-life inventor Robert Kearns, who in the 1960s became embroiled in a legal battle with the automotive industry. Kearns was responsible for creating the intermit-

A Paralympic dream realized

The wind-swept waters of China's Yellow Sea beckoned the 14 yachts waiting for the start signal to cut through its frothy whitecaps.

For jib trimmer Marc Shaw of Canada's Team Raven, it was a Paralympic dream about to unfold.

The team of three sailors had competed for three years at sailing regattas across the globe, but the calibre of this event surged them with a rush of adrenaline that would last for 11 races over five days.

Before taking his place aboard the seven-metre yacht on Sept. 8 at the Qingdao Olympic Sailing Center, Shaw was chosen to be the flag bearer for Team Canada at the opening sailing ceremonies one day earlier.

"It was quite an honour to be carrying the Canadian flag," said Shaw whose girlfriend and parents were in the crowd.

The road to Beijing for the Fleet Maintenance Facility Cape Breton employee began 15 years ago when he lost his leg in a workplace accident in the oil patches in Northern B.C.

A drilling exploration charge blew up in front of him. After two years of recovery and fighting to keep his leg, it eventually had to be amputated below the knee.

When asked in 2005 to join Don Terlson and Ken Kelly to race in disabled regattas, Shaw saw it as a positive challenge.

The team quickly learned to sail as a threesome in

the Sonar, which has a fixed keel for greater stability, two sails and a cockpit. They also had to adjust to each other's disability. Skipper Kelly is a paraplegic and Terlson's left arm is crippled.

They qualified for Beijing from their placement in the America's Regatta in November 2007, and Miami Regatta in January 2008.

In May, it looked as if Kelly would have to forfeit his Paralympics dream when he broke his leg. But two months of healing were enough to get him back in the cockpit.

On the water in Qingdao, strong currents and varied wind conditions made it difficult to judge their course plan. The boats were so close many of the races were photo finishes.

In race four, the threesome picked the right course, zigging and zagging their way through the waves into their best Paralympics finish fourth place.

After the final race, Team Raven secured 11th place in the world.

The three weeks ended with spirited closing ceremonies. Fireworks shot a rainbow of electricity into the sky. Acrobatic performers somersaulted from the rafters and the Chinese played host to Shaw's memories of the 2008 Paralympics.

"We sailed against some of the best boats in the world, and at 63, our skipper was the oldest guy in the sailing Paralympics," Shaw said. "I remember being there on the dock and looking back and seeing the Olympic torch burning. It was hard to believe that we were really at the Paralympics."

Changes to your Outlook at work

Canada has two official languages, and starting Dec. 31, 2008, every DND/CF employee will have to sign their emails in both French and English, even if they can't communicate proficiently in both.

If you don't know what Chief Petty Officer Second Class translates to "en Francais," don't fret. The DND terminology bank is one tool available to help decipher members' ranks and most major units' names (find it at http:// terminology.mil.ca/indexeng.asp.)

Templates are also available on the Maritime Forces Pacific (MARPAC) Notice Board and at Base Information Services (BIS) Client Services.

In accordance with the Treasury Board Secretariat's Common Look and Feel Standards for the Internet 2.0, all public servants' emails must include enough information to clearly identify the sender

and the institution they represent, as well as contact information for phone. facsimile and postal mail.

Warren Skaalrud, Client Services Manager at BIS, said the new bilingual email signature block is mandatory for all email users, because there is no guarantee regarding the end-use of the information, especially when sent outside the Government of Canada.

"Even though DND and CF employees aren't mandated to use the bilingual signature block until Dec.31, 2008, we recommend that everyone start using it now," he said. "After Dec.1, I will have a team from BIS looking for the email users who have not yet switched over, and they will be contacting them and asking them to update their signature."

Email Address Change Changes are also being made to the format of DND employees' and CF members' email addresses. Starting Nov. 1, 2008, emails will be firstname.

lastame@forces.gc.ca. Both the old and new email address will work for a one year period ending November 2009, after which only the new one will work. Sending and receiving email from BlackBerry devices will not be affected.

Many people using the system have common names, and where duplicates exist, a number will be added at the end of the last name to decipher between them.

If you go by a name other than your given name, please notify your Information Technology Coordinator, who will then contact BIS to make sure your email address corresponds with your preferences.

It is recommended to send an announcement email to all your contacts, both inside and outside DND, to update their contact lists with the new address. Business cards will also need to be updated.

Outlook Storage Change Changes are also being made to the mailbox storage limit for approximately 450 Consolidated Secure Network Infrastructure (CSNI or MCOIN) users. Effective Oct. 14, the mailbox storage limit will be 250 Megabytes.

"This will be especially important when people go on leave. If they don't use an "Out of Office" auto-reply message asking people not to send large files while they are away, they will return to work only to discover they can't send or receive email because they are over the storage limit," Skaalrud said.

He recommends using personal folders stored on the Q drive to keep the size of the mailbox to a minimum. Doing a weekly purge of your inbox is also a good idea, he said. If more space is required,

Ville De Québec escort mission extended

Canada has agreed to extend support to the World Food Programme (WFP) humanitarian operation currently provided by *HMCS Ville de Québec*.

This operation, which allows the safe shipment of life-saving humanitarian assistance into Somalia, will be extended to Oct. 23. On Aug. 6, Ville de Québec was assigned to escort civilian vessels loaded with humanitarian food aid from Mombasa, Kenya to Mogadishu, Somalia, at the request of the WFP and the International Maritime Organization (IMO), both agencies of the United

Nations. This task was set

to end Sept.27, but it has been extended to allow the WFP more time to secure a replacement naval escort.

Since 2007, warships from NATO nations have been escorting WFP shipments from Kenya to Somalia to ensure their safe passage through waters notorious for piracy.

The WFP shipments are

intended to meet the urgent needs of more than 2.4 million Somalis who rely on food aid, of which 90 per cent arrives by sea. So far, 22,000 tonnes (22,000,000 kilograms) of corn and soy meal — enough to feed 145,125 people for a year — have been delivered to Somalia by ships escorted by *Ville de Québec*.

St. John heads home from Haiti

HMCS St. John's, based at CFB Halifax, along with elements of the Joint Headquarters Kingston, have completed their support to the World Food Programme's (WFP) humanitarian aid in Haiti as part of Operation Horatio.

St. John's was involved in a coordinated effort that had them delivering desperately needed humanitarian aid by hand, crane, sea and air. The ship's sailors and aircrew delivered more than 450 metric tons of rice, corn-soya meal, bottled water, waterpurification tablets and other relief supplies over a 13-day period.

Flying in excess of 20 aircraft missions, the ship's Sea King helicopter, based at 12 Wing Shearwater, delivered more than 300 cargo loads. In addition, Joint Headquarters Kingston supported and helped coordinate on the ground with other government departments from Canada, the Government of Haiti and the WFP.

Operation Horatio was launched as a result of Canada's decision to assist in the delivery of humanitarian aid after the country was ravaged by severe hurricanes. At the request of the Haitian Prime Minister and the WFP, the Canadian Forces was asked to focus its efforts in the southern region of the country where needs were not being met. *St. John's* was dispatched to the area and immediately took action.

The WFP says they now have sufficient sealift capability and helicopters in place to take over the efforts of the Canadian mission.

Stop careless behaviour and prevent home fires

 $S\xspace{1.5}$ tatistics show that, on average, fire kills eight people each week in Canada, with residential fires accounting for 73 per cent of these fatalities.

Despite the fact that fewer fire losses are reported in Canada, most of these fires are preventable and caused by careless behaviour. That is why it is critical to educate Canadians and incite them to act.

To this point, Fire Prevention Canada's newly revamped website contains fire prevention and educational material. It is designed for the public to consult at, www.fiprecan.ca.

Be proactive:

• Plan two escape routes from every room and practice home fire drills.

• Each year, thousands of fires are caused by careless or improper use of cooking equipment. Never leave cooking appliances unattended when in use, and be cautious when cooking with oil. All cooking fires are preventable, so remember to select the proper heat for the food being prepared and keep your stove top clean and clear at all times.

• Every year in Canada, approximately 1,300 fires are started by children playing with matches and lighters. Keep matches and lighters out of sight and out of reach of children.

• Careless smoking is the leading cause of home fire deaths. A smoker falling asleep in an upholstered chair or bed is the most common occurrence. Never



smoke or allow someone to smoke when they are under the influence of medication, alcohol or drugs.

• Fire sprinklers go to work immediately to reduce fire danger by releasing water directly over the heat source, preventing the intense heat and smoke associated with fires. Having fire sprinklers in your home is like having firefighters guarding your home 24 hours a day. Sprinklers save lives by providing more precious time to allow for escape.

• Smoke alarms are the first line of defence against a deadly fire. By developing a fire escape plan and practicing it often, you will be prepared to react correctly if a fire strikes.

On average, eight Canadians die from fire every week. Most of these fires are preventable and caused by careless behaviour.

Navy Dragon Anchors, all guts, all glory

A hand-delivered Bravo Zulu from the Admiral, a giant trophy, and free entry into the 2009 Portland Dragon Boat Festival have tipped the scales of success for the Navy Dragon Anchors.

From April to September, the mix of military and civilian paddlers competed in six festivals, and took home the gold in three.

Team coach Rob Grigor has been with the team since its inception eight years ago, but has never witnessed such success.

"I'm proud of the commitment that the team showed to me and to their fellow paddlers," said Grigor. "We are competing with some of the best teams out there and beating them."

RAdm Tyrone Pile visited Grigor at his workplace in Work Point to hand deliver the Bravo Zulu certificate for his years of dedication bringing the navy face to the public.

"We came to see Rob get his certificate," said CPO2 Max Michel, team captain. "It was quite an honour and it recognized Rob for his role in showcasing the navy in the dragon boat community. The only reason the team keeps going is because of Rob's coaching skills."

Twice a week, under Grigor's direction, they clambered into the boat at Gorge Rowing and Paddling Centre to train. While most races were held in B.C., there was one road trip across the border to Portland. No one expected top results. As always, they put a lot of elbow grease into the standard Dragon Boat race and, while they didn't win, they did earn a place in the extreme "No Guts No Glory" 2,600-metre haul.

Eight boats lined up at the start, paddles gripped firmly in everyone's hands, waiting to dip into the water with full force. After 13 minutes and 22.7 seconds, it was Canada's Navy Dragon Anchors that sped across the finish line.

When the team accepted the challenge, they didn't know the top prize was a two-foot trophy and free entry into the next year's festival.

Their successes were

spread throughout the summer, and with each win, team morale grew. Dressed in shirts embellished with a white dragon grasping an anchor in its talons, the team showed vibrant energy during their races. Songs such as *Heart* of Oak bellowed from their throats as they marched from the paddlers' village in unison, energizing the crowd.

"The biggest accomplishment was a total commitment of teamwork on the water," said team manager CPO1 Bob Wiggins.

At the end of the last race in Kelowna over the Sept. 13 weekend, the team walked away with their final gold, and the fastest time of the weekend with 2:04.35 paddling a 500metre stretch. In total, they accomplished three wins, one second place and one third over the summer.

With the season now over, Grigor and the team of 23 paddlers are massaging their calluses, putting away their Tiger Balm and reflecting on the many summer days of training and competition.

Next year, they've set their sights on competing abroad. And while CPO2 Michel and Grigor agree it will be challenging travelling to another country due to costs, transport, and time off work, they hope to accomplish it. In keeping with Dragon Boat heritage, they are considering South East Asian countries.

"I have no idea how we are going to top winning three festivals next year, but it will be a year to build on our successes," said Grigor.

Golf team takes home Pacific Regional win

On the final day of play at the Pacific Region Golf Championships, CPO2 Damien McCabe found himself in the trees to the left and 155 yards from the pin on hole five.

"My ball was five yards behind a tree with no straight shot to the green and a lateral hazard straight down my line," he said.

But that didn't faze the sailor from CFB Esquimalt. He hit a fantastic recovery, landing him on the green, and in perfect position to walk away with par.

Tournament winner CPO2 McCabe calls this shot his best play of the 54-hole stroke play tournament, hosted by 19 Wing Comox at the Glacier Greens Golf Course, Lazo B.C., Sept 16-19.

He finished with a threeday overall score of 225, seven shots ahead of the second low gross winner, Comox's MWO Richard Martin, with 232.

But winning the individual title wasn't CPO2 McCabe's main focus. CFB Esquimalt's A Team, of which McCabe is a member, took home the team champion banner and trophy for the fourth year in a row.

"When playing against other bases, it is a team event more so than an individual win. Anytime an away team can beat the home team, life is great," CPO2 McCabe said. "I appreciated winning the Pacific Regional's, but my goal is to represent Canada at the 6th CISM World Military Golf Championship being hosted by Namibia, Africa, next year."

CFB Esquimalt had two five-man teams in the regional finals. Each team was chosen at the play-downs held at the Gorge Vale Golf Course in early September. No women tried out for the team this year.

Team A consisted of MS

Rob Turnbull, team captain, PO1 Gilles LeBlanc, CPO2 Damien McCabe, Capt Dave Mansi, and PO2 John Ellis.

Also competing for the Pacific Region title were Tyndall Air Force Base in Florida (NORAD) and a host team from 19 Wing Comox. Comox finished second

overall and CFB Esquimalt B Team finished third.

"We were happy to come home with the trophy," said PO1 Gilles LeBlanc. "We all did what we could to help the team and the results prove our hard work paid off."

Next year, the winners from the five regional tournaments across the Canadian Forces will compete against each other in the first ever National Golf Championships.

"That's what I love about competitive golf. By the end of the 18 holes it feels like you've been playing your whole lives together," said said PO1 LeBlanc.

Analyzing adventure training - to Hell's Gate and back

Day One – Mon Sept. 15 Just after 7 a.m. on a clear Monday morning, a van carrying six personnel from CFB Esquimalt's Acoustics Data Analysis Centre – Pacific (ADAC – P) departed the base for the Swartz Bay – Tsawwassen ferry. Yale was to be the final destination.

The mission? For the next week, the crew of the Major Mike Verville (unit Commanding Officer), Capt James Wright, PO2 Craig Elliot, MS Dave Schertzer, LS Ross Collison and myself would undertake whitewater rafting adventure training.

Around 2 p.m. the crew arrived at the site of the Fraser River Raft Expeditions company, where they met the staff, who briefed us on what lay ahead.

A base camp was set up, but being very curious, the crew went exploring. We went to the Hell's Gate Air Tram for a view of one of the most treacherous canyons on the Fraser River, and then hiked to the rusty Alexandria Bridge, a former Trans-Canada Highway crossing point.

Later we would pass by these landmarks by raft.

Day Two – Tues Sept. 16

We rose early to have breakfast, then washed up and broke camp. Unlike last year's caving expedition, this time we were constantly on the move.

At 9:30 a.m. the crew and guides departed Yale for our drop off point about 130 kilometres north, near Ashcroft, on the Thompson River. At this beach, our gear was loaded onto a 35-foot four pontoon supply raft, which was piloted by Simon, one of our guides. The crew paddled a six-person raft and an additional two-person kayak, under the direction of the other guide and raft coxswain, Lisa.

The first leg down the Thompson River presented a myriad of challenges. We tackled many stretches of white-water rapids, which included names such as Devil's Kitchen, Bone Crusher, Cutting Board, Jaws, Garburator, Witches Caldron, and finally the 18th Hole. We paddled frantically as the crew got smashed, rolled, shaken and wet ... very wet. Thankfully, we were outfitted with the appropriate wet suits. Moreover, we were fortunate to have some rather warm summer-like weather throughout the expedition, so we dried fast.

At some stretches we took it easy and just let the current move us. As we viewed the majestic scenery of rocks, cliffs and trees, Lisa told us some trivia about the area we were travelling through. We had a sense of what Alexander Mackenzie and Simon Fraser went through nearly two hundred years ago.

Just prior to our camp, Lisa suggested this was a good area to practice "white-water survival floating" with the legs forward, knees slightly bent and looking downstream. Being such a warm day two brave souls took the plunge.

After our 40-km transit we set up camp on the shore of the Thompson River in the late afternoon. Except for the railway tracks on both sides of the river, the wilderness was largely unspoiled. It was quiet except for the rushing of the water and the occasional roar of trains. It was amazing to see how much rolling stock passes through those canyons throughout the day and night.

Lisa and Simon fixed us a Mexican feast and shared more rafting stories. They both appreciated our compliments that they would do well as navy cooks.

Day Three – Wed Sept. 17 After a leisurely breakfast we loaded up and left camp at mid-morning. We came to the junction of the Thompson and Fraser Rivers about an hour later, where we saw a curious black bear that had come down the river embankment to check us out.

We found the temperature of the Fraser was much cooler. The routine was similar to the previous day. We paddled like mad through stretches of rapids and then experienced calm water conditions.

At each point Lisa's Kiwi accent would sound off in an insightful narrative. Temperatures continued in the mid twenties, and skies remained sunny and clear. We had one stop for lunch, and another for hiking up a creek to an abandoned railway tunnel.

After transiting about 65 kms downriver, we set up camp on the shore of the Fraser. Again, Lisa and Simon outdid themselves by giving us a banyanlike meal, complete with Hawaiian-style Tiki lights as dusk fell. We knew there would be more challenges the next day.

Day Four – Thurs Sept. 18 Again we went through the morning routine of breakfast and breaking camp. We left the camp at 9:30 a.m. to board Simon's motorized pontoon raft, with the smaller raft in tow as we continued down the Fraser River.

This time we did not have to paddle in the quiet water, but just gaze at the remains of multiple train wrecks. We rendezvoused with the staff at Boston Bar to unload the excess gear, as well as the small raft and kayak.

We boarded the pontoon raft with Lisa as the coxswain. Simon followed us in a smaller motordriven raft. Don't think that because we were not paddling that things had become easy.

Actually we went on to transit some of the most treacherous stretches of the Fraser such as Hell's Gate and China Bar. At the Sailors' Bar rapids, we conducted five runs, motoring back upstream for more action; in the end we were all soaked.

Lisa had done this route many times before, and we could not help but notice her mischievous smile each time we approached the rapids.

By late afternoon we made it back to Yale. In keeping with B.C.'s 150th anniversary, Lisa told us about how Yale was once a gold rush boomtown of 10,000 people, and now has only 150 residents. We then returned our wet gear, packed up, said our goodbyes and departed for our long trip back to Victoria.

Overall this was a great team building expedition, as teamwork was essential to keep the raft from flipping in the giant whirlpools. We transited over 130 kms on both the Thompson and Fraser Rivers on rafts, and without any major incidents or injuries. ADAC(P) has gone to Hell's Gate, conquered the challenge and returned.
