





DOCUMENT MANAGEMENT: CHANGES COMING NEXT YEAR

# New way to store files

Filing cabinets crammed with paper documents are taking up vital space at CFB Esquimalt.

On top of that, finding information quickly is challenging, even if it's saved on a network drive, which often has numerous copies of documents complicating data retrieval and taking up virtual storage space.

To streamline information management, Maritime Forces Pacific (MARPAC) and Joint Task Force (Pacific) are transitioning to a new way of storing data.

The Records Document Information Management System (RDIMS) is a suite of electronic records management software products that will enable users to retrieve data in an efficient way. It is currently in use at Maritime Forces Atlantic, Chief of Maritime Staff, ADM (Mat) and other federal government departments.

"Bringing in a tool like RDIMS won't solve all of our information management challenges, but it is a tool that will allow us to implement our vision of ready-access to electronic records," says IM officer and RDIMS implementation manager, Lt(N) Bruce Winter.

The system is an "electronic filing cabinet" where paper documents will be scanned and stored, and electronic documents archived. The author of each document has the ability to profile the data, making it searchable by all RDIMS users. This will allow users access to pertinent information in a timely manner.

Information Holdings Officer Guylaine Lambert says the implementation of RDIMS for MARPAC and JTFP users is simply following the Government of Canada's legislation regarding corporate records management. All federal government users must comply with information management legislation.

By law, any document or correspondence that requires the commitment of resources, such as time or money, is considered corporate records and must be archived in accordance with Treasury Board direction. Working drafts of these documents are also considered corporate records. RDIMS has the capability to save drafts alongside the finished document, allowing users to follow the changes made to each document by date and author.

"We have to get away from the idea that our work is our personal property," Lambert said. "Anyone from outside has the right through the Access to Information Act to request information from the Department, including drafts of those documents. Now we will have them all saved in the same place, which will greatly reduce the stress imposed upon staff that currently have to search a number of places, both manually and electronically, for that information."

RDIMS is integrated with the Microsoft Office Suite, including Word and Outlook, making it possible to store and archive any document or email correspondence by profiling it during the saving process. It also gives the author the option to make the docu-

ment read-only or allow only specific users access to the data.

RDIMS will allow users to free up space in their Outlook in-boxes because, instead of sending files as attachments, they can be saved into the RDIMS database and be retrieved by any RDIMS user, simply by clicking on the link.

There will be no need to save a corporate document into a personal folder or on a shared network drive because the document will be readily available in the RDIMS database.

All hardware and software is in place on MARPAC/Joint Task Force (Pacific) computers.

Training began for Records Management Administrators at the end of November. Administrative Assistants (Super users) will undergo training starting in January 2009. MARPAC HQ is scheduled to be the first unit for implementation, currently scheduled in February 2009.

A training team will administer classroom-style training to all RDIMS users, with each unit being trained by March 2010.

The current Document Management Control System (DMCS) will no longer be used after Feb. 2, 2009, when RDIMS will become the repository for the Formation's corporate documents.

# Steele, champion of the Canadian Forces

Cedric Steele grew up with a fascination for the military.

In his birth country of South Africa everyone was required to serve in the army. Unfortunately, Polio in his shoulder prevented him from enlisting.

Years later, he found the military involvement he was craving when he was appointed Honorary Captain (Navy) at CFB Esquimalt.

Normally the appointment is a three-year commitment; however, HCapt(N) Steele has held the rank for 11 years and recently received a letter asking him to remain until 2011.

He started off in his position making speeches to clubs talking about the impact of the navy on the community and what the navy does for Canada. But his involvement has grown both on and off the base, and the list of his initiatives is long. Two big bold signs at both entrances to Victoria announcing "Home of Canada's Pacific Naval Fleet" are his most visual accomplishments.

In a quieter manner, he arranges day sails for civilian business owners and has a list of 200 names of people wishing to sail. This provides an opportunity for civilians to meet their sailors and experience sea life, even if it's only for a day. "I think it's very positive for

the Canadian Forces and the community. It's removed the mystery of what lies behind the gates at CFB Esquimalt and allows civilians to meet sailors face to face and see the commitment they make to Canada."

Steele came to the attention of the military when he was president of the Greater Victoria Chamber of Commerce in 1980. Wanting to be involved with the military, he started taking groups of business owners to bases across Canada to show them how the army reserve operates.

"Because of the interest that I had shown in the Canadian Forces, I was invited to sail with HMCS Regina to Vietnam," said HCapt(N) Steele. He jumped at the opportunity.

Soon after his return, he was appointed Honorary Captain, a unique position that aims to strengthen relations between the community and military through liaisons such as Steele's.

"I've learned the most from this opportunity, and these years have been the best times of my life," he says. "I've been able to get outside individuals involved, and open up the floodgate to get information flowing back and forth."

The support he has given to Maritime Forces Pacific, the base and the Canadian Forces in general has been overwhelming, said Capt(N) Marcel Hallé, Base Commander. Being a new base commander and also new resident to the area, Capt(N) Hallé is grateful on behalf of the CF in general for Steele's demonstrated leadership and efforts to raise public understanding of what the navy does.

Now 64 years old, HCapt(N) Steele continues to develop his role at CFB Esquimalt and says he wants to be involved as long as he can be useful to the navy.

# This week, a few losers and one doozy

Canadians get an early gift this week as American Thanksgiving pushes new releases to Wednesday.

Debuting a bit early, Transporter 3 has Jason Statham muscling his way across Europe with a "delivery" in tow; an epic romance blossoms between Nicole Kidman and Hugh Jackman in Baz Luhrmann's Australia, while Four Christmases copies the usual lame Christmas comedy routine. The only truly great release this week has Sean Penn starring in Milk, about the life of Harvey Milk.

Transporter 3

Who knew that couriers had it so bad? In the third instalment of the Transporter franchise. Jason Statham is back as the no-nonsense Frank Martin, a professional, high-end "transporter" who delivers anything, for a price. And it seems there are lots of people who don't want him to get where he's going.

In the latest adventure, Frank is forced into taking Valentina (Natalya Rudakova), the kidnapped daughter of the Ukraine's

Fighting off a veritable army of goons along the way, and trying to keep Valentina from escaping, Frank will once again have to prove why he's the best at what he does, with just a little help from his friend, Inspector Tarconi (Francois Berland).

Genius, this series is not, but to date the Transporter films have been reliably action-packed, and Statham is just too much fun to watch in this role. Thanks to writer/producer Luc Besson, the series also happens to be one of the few that remains as good as when it started.

#### Australia

On the other end of pretension comes Baz Luhrmann's big, bombastic Australia. Starring Nicole Kidman as a rich English woman stuck in Australia during the Second World War, the story is an epic war romance that has Hugh Jackman playing the neighbourly love interest who tries to help Kidman's character from







# What every Canadian should know about Afghanistan

How much does the average Canadian know about what Canadian troops and civilians are doing in Afghanistan?

After years of working as a defence analyst, and much involvement with Afghanistan, retired air force Brigadier-General Don Macnamara is baffled by the lack of public knowledge among Canadians, and wants to educate people on what is not being covered in the media.

BGen Macnamara worked first as deputy-director of strategic policy planning when the Russians invaded Afghanistan in 1979; he then visited the Afghanistan - Pakistan border area and mujahedin camps in 1982, and returned in 2006 and 2008 as part of a group of defence analysts.

"The situation in Afghanistan effects Canadians more than just our troops being there, our own Canadian security depends on it," said BGen Macnamara at the Union Club's speaker's luncheon on Nov. 17.

"It's in a nasty neighbourhood," he added, referring to the six nuclear weapons countries that surround the landlocked country.

Bordered by Pakistan, Tajikistan, Turkmenistan, Uzbekistan, China and Iran, Afghanistan has a 30-year history of war that began with the invasion of the Soviet Union in 1979, and has evolved over the years into a multitude of problems. Al Qaeda, Taliban, drug (poppy growing) interests, warlord power interests, highway robbers, kidnappers and common criminals all play a part in daily Afghan society.

"If you can imagine a circumstance where there is simply no income, and no way to feed your family, people get desperate and resort to kidnapping for ransom. When order, security and economy collapse, people do what they need to survive, and threats are an imminent part of life," said BGen Macnamara.

About the size of Manitoba, but with the population of Canada, Afghanistan has many problems. A literacy rate of 42 per cent affects the population that is trying to pick up the pieces following years of warfare and rebuild their economy.

"It has many issues, but has already made significant progress since our involvement,"

said BGen Macnamara.

Canadians have been involved in over 20 UN and other missions in Southwest Asia (from the Nile to the Indus) since the end of the Second World War. Since 2001, as part of Operation Enduring Freedom, Canada played a role to rid the country of Al Qaeda, and to track down Osama Bin Laden. Then in 2003, Canadians provided security to Kabul and assisted the return of the government, and in 2005 the mission took on a security-governance and development assistance role in Kandahar province as part of the NATO International Security Assistance Force, explained BGen Macnamara.

"In 2006 when I visited Afghanistan it was a pile of rubble, but when I went back in 2008 the change was dramatic. Businesses were thriving, and people in cities showed no sense of insecurity," he says, attributing the success in Kandahar to the work of the Canadian Forces security force and the provincial reconstruction team.

British, Canadian, American and Dutch/German troops are

helping the situation and have each established a Provincial Reconstruction Team in Southern Afghanistan. The Kandahar team involves 500 military and civilian Canadians, and is doing so well it's now being used as an example for all other reconstruction teams in Afghanistan.

Plus, the 2,500 Canadian soldiers and civilians are helping rebuild the Afghan National Army and the Afghan National Police to strengthen the country's security.

"From the beginning, our goal has been to establish security in the country so Afghans can live in peace and prosperity. Without security we can't help people," said BGen Macnamara.

In addition to strengthening security, Canada is providing humanitarian aid, strengthening health care and providing basic services to rebuild the economy. Canadians have provided for Afghan children vaccinations for Polio.

"A total of 7 million children have now received vaccinations through our polio eradication program. From January to September 2008, 20 new cases have been reported in the southern region, demonstrating a compelling need for the campaign. Canada is prepared to meet this challenge."

Canadians are also active in other areas, such as Bamiyan Province north of Kabul. A Canadian NGO, inspired by Flora MacDonald, and thanks to Canadians who purchased photocells at Canadian Tire, has helped several villages get electricity so people can read and go to school in light or darkness, said BGen Macnamara.

The Government of Canada, following the Manley report, has set 2011 as the year troops leave Afghanistan. "We only have another three years there to provide security, but we are going to stay there a long time on the civilian side contributing to both governance and development."

BGen Macnamara spent 37 years in the Royal Canadian Air Force and Canadian Forces, and spent the last half of his military career teaching strategic planning and analysis. He is still active in teaching through the Canadian Forces College in Toronto, where he was appointed Honorary Colonel. He serves on the Air Command Advisory Council and Board of Governors of the Royal Military College.





# Special award given at National Sports Award Ceremony

During the 20th Annual Canadian Forces Sports Awards Ceremony on Nov. 22, athletic therapist Stephanie Dempsey was presented with the Director Sports Recreation and Messes Recognition Award for her commitment and dedication to rehabilitating sports injuries at CFB Esquimalt.

"To be recognized for doing a job I love is an honour, but to receive an award presented at the Canadian War Museum in Ottawa is an absolute career high," said Dempsey, who sat among 300 athletes, officials,  $\check{VIP}$ 's and

sponsors before standing up to receive her award.

Since November 2005, Dempsey has been healing sports injuries and preparing athletes for competitions as part of her work at Personnel Support Programs (PSP). Her position was the first of its kind within the Canadian Forces, and is geared to offer assessment and rehabilitation of orthopedic injuries to military members.

"The goal of athletic therapy is to return the member to his or her job and sport as quickly and safely as possible, ideally in better condition than pre-injury," said Dempsey. "Naturally every patient that walks through the door has something to teach me as well. I have been blessed to work with a wide range of personnel with an even wider range of injuries and conditions. Each day brings a new lesson, and sometimes more than one."

At sporting events, Dempsey provides the initial treatment and stabilizes the injury before the person is transported to hospital for a more detailed diagnosis.

New patients must be referred to her through Formation Health Services, who assess a patient's needs before determining if Dempsey's service will be helpful for them.

Dempsey's job has taken her to India to oversee the sporting needs of women's swim and soccer teams during the Council International Sport Militare (CISM) world

# CDS honours Ville de Quebec

A visit by the Chief of the Defence Staff, General Walter Natynczyk to HMCS Ville de Québec Nov. 21, at sea off the south coast of France, culminated in the presentation of a Canadian Forces Unit Commendation for excellent performance of duty.

Brought on board the day before by the ship's Sea King helicopter, the CDS visited Ville de Québec, currently deployed on Operation Sextant with Standing NATO Maritime Group 1 in the Mediterranean

The award of the CF Unit Commendation arose from an emergency tasking, from Aug. 10 to Oct. 29, when the Halifax-based frigate was diverted from Op Sextant to the pirate-infested waters off east Africa.

The ship was attached to the Canadian flotilla deployed on Operation Altair (Canada's naval participation in the campaign against terrorism), and assigned to escort freighters transporting humanitarian aid supplies for the World Food Programme from Mombasa, Kenya to Mogadishu, Somalia.

During his two-day visit to the ship, Gen Natynczyk toured the flats (hallways) to visit crew members at their duty stations, congratulate them individually for their excellent work on the humanitarian mission, and present CDS coins to those who performed with particular distinction.

The visit's main event was an all-ranks gathering held in the ship's hangar in a town hall format that combined an address from the CDS with questions and comments from the crew. It was in this forum that Gen Natynczyk sprang his big surprise: the presentation to Commander Chris Dickinson, the ship's commanding officer, of the gold-embossed scroll of the CF Unit Commendation, along with the symbols of the honour, a special commemorative flag and a gold medallion.

"You overcame the operational difficulties associated with simultaneously providing World Food Programme vessels with onboard security and naval escort," said Gen Natynczyk.

Emphasizing that the award is for every member of the ship's company, he went on to say, "Thanks to your dedication and flexibility, food was able to travel through those pirate-infested waters, bringing new hope to hundreds of thousands of people and shining a very favourable light on Canada and the Canadian Forces."



Through candid interviews with friends, family and fellow soldiers who witnessed the attack, Peace Warrior builds an intimate portrait of a man whose strong will and positive attitude, combined with his peak physical and mental shape before the attack, allow him to surpass everyone's expectations, despite his devastating brain injury.





In part, the citation reads: "Commander [now Capt(N)] Hawco's brilliant operational acumen included a high visibility boarding operation against a vessel suspected of trafficking international terrorists, and crucial escort duties for a damaged United States submarine transiting the treacherous Straits of Hormuz. His exhaustive efforts greatly improved maritime security and raised the bar for coalition operations. Commander Hawco's exceptional professionalism, personal initiative, and loyal dedication to duty reflected great credit upon him and were in keeping with the highest traditions of the naval service."

The Meritorious Service Medal is awarded to any member of the armed forces of the U.S. or to any member of the armed forces of a friendly foreign nation who, while serving in a noncombat area after Jan. 16, 1969, has distinguished himself or herself bv outstanding meritorious achievement or service.

"It is nice to know that the work you have done has been recognized and it was, to be honest, a surprise to learn I was being honoured with an award from the United States," said Capt(N) Hawco. "In my heart of hearts, this award really recognizes the tremendous work that Ottawa accomplished throughout the deployment, particularly the work of her special teams."

He added that most people in the navy know the level of effort and dedication it takes to get a ship ready for an extended overseas deployment.

"Ottawa was no different and it was the phenomenal work of the entire ship that made it happen. I am deeply touched that my United States chain of command was sufficiently impressed by the performance of Ottawa that I, as her commanding officer, am being recognized for her performance."

As to the significance of recognition by an ally, Capt(N) Hawco says that 'while you know that your own chain of command will, as a matter of leadership, recommend deserving individuals for honours and awards, receiving recognition from an ally is a clear reflection of how well our professional relationships have evolved. Military leadership trancends nationality and environment-receiving recognition in this fashion fosters even closer working relationships and willingness for different countries to work together."

# ELECTIONS BC

# PROVINCIAL VOTER IDENTIFICATION REQUIREMENTS

The Election Act establishes that voters must prove their identity and residential address in order to receive a ballot or register to vote in conjunction with voting in a provincial general election or by-election.

Voters must provide either:

• one document issued by the Government of B.C. or Canada that contains the voter's name, photograph and residential address, such as a B.C driver's licence or B.C Identification card (BCID)

• a Certificate of Indian Status

OR

• two documents that contain the voter's name. At least one of the documents must also contain the voter's residential address.

The Chief Electoral Officer has authorized the following types of documents for this purpose.

#### Government-issued identity documents

(e.g. health care card, birth certificate, social insurance card, passport, citizenship document/certificate, Old Age Security card, etc.)

#### Other government-issued documents

(e.g. property tax assessment, income tax assessment notice, government cheque)

#### School/college/university-issued document

(e.g. admissions letter, report card, transcript, residence acceptance, tuition/fees statement, student card)

#### Other documents

- Bank/credit card or statement
- Residential lease/mortgage statement
- Insurance statement
- Public transportation pass
- Utility bill
- Membership card
- Hospital bracelet/document
- Attestation of residence

Voters without the necessary identification can be vouched for by a voter in their electoral district who does have the necessary ID, a direct family member or someone who has legal authority to make personal care decisions for the voter.

Have your identification ready for the May 12, 2009 General Election.





# **Practice** fire safety

A portable fire extinguisher can save lives and property by putting out a small fire or containing it until the fire department arrives; however, portable extinguishers have limitations. Because fire grows and spreads so rapidly, the number one priority for residents is to get out safely.

#### Safety tips:

Only use a portable fire extinguisher when you feel safe to do so, the fire department has been called or is being called; and the room is not filled with smoke.

To operate a fire extinguisher, remember the word PASS:

- Pull the pin. Hold the extinguisher with the nozzle pointing away from you, and release the locking mechanism.
- Aim low. Point the extinguisher at the base of the
- Squeeze the lever slowly and evenly.
- Sweep the nozzle from side-to-side.

For the home, select a multi-purpose extinguisher (can be used on all types of home fires) that is large enough to put out a small fire, but not so heavy as to be difficult to handle.

Choose a fire extinguisher that carries the label of an independent testing laboratory.

Read the instructions that come with the fire extinguisher and become familiar with its parts and operation before a fire breaks out. Local fire departments or fire equipment distributors often offer hands-on fire extinguisher training.

Install fire extinguishers close to an exit and keep your back to a clear exit when you use the device so you can make an easy escape if the fire cannot be controlled. If the room fills with smoke, leave immediately.

Know when to go. Fire extinguishers are one element of a fire response plan, but the primary element is safe escape. Every household should have a home fire escape plan and working smoke alarms.

Your local Fire Prevention Bureau offers FAFFE (First Aid Fire Fighting Equipment) courses to all members of the CF/DND community. All new workers need to have this training and everyone has to re-train every four years. You can organize to take the training through your local training coordinator.If you have any questions or concerns please contact the CFB Esquimalt Fire Rescue Fire Prevention Branch at 250-363-1538.
