

# Security training unfolds in Vancouver this week

Almost a year before the opening ceremonies of the 2010 Vancouver Winter Olympics, Joint Task Force Games and the Land, Air and Maritime Component Commands are participating in the first live security training to prepare the military for the sporting event.

Exercise Silver is the second of three government-wide security exercises designed to integrate the security team for the Olympic and Paralympic games.

More than 100 municipal, provincial and federal agencies, including 500 CF members, are in the air, at sea and on the ground this week in support of the RCMPled Integrated Security Unit (ISU)

The CF component on the exercise is dubbed Exercise Staunch Maple 09 and has members from the army, navy and air force in Vancouver, Whistler and the Seato-Sky corridor. The entire CF Olympic security effort is called Operation Podium, and is led by Rear Admiral Tyrone Pile. Each CF element is lead by a Component Commander, each with their own command centre.

Alongside BC Place are HMC Ships Calgary, Regina, Edmonton, and Yellowknife, and Patrol Craft Training Wolf and Renard. Other naval assets include the Operational Dive Team and a Port Security Unit made up of more than 100 reservists from 22 of the 24 Naval Reserve Divisions across Canada.

## Maritime Component Commander

Assets from Maritime Forces across the country that are participating in Exercise Silver, and eventually Operation Podium in 2010, work under the Maritime Component Commander Capt(N) Gilles Couturier.

Based out of Vancouver's Naval Reserve Division, HMCS Discovery, Capt(N) Couturier and his headquarter staff will coordinate the navy-led maritime surveillance, interdiction, coastal patrols, port security and diving operations within the RCMP-led marine security unit. The RCMP will also establish their headquarter in Discovery, allowing RCMP, navy and various other government department assets to work in close cooperation throughout the Olympics.

Five ships and hundreds of sailors, one third of whom will be Naval Reservists, are involved in the 14-day training.

"We have a lot of interest from Naval Reservists to partake in this operation. For Op Podium, we will be looking at reservists from across the country participating in Exercise Gold in November and Op Podium from mid January to the end of the Paralympics in March," said Capt(N) Couturier.

The Operational Dive Team, comprised of Port Inspection Divers and Clearance Divers, are working with the RCMP Dive Team to provide underwater investigation and sweeps of key locations.

While exercise Pegasus Guardian 2.2, a command post exercise, was taking place last week, the ships were at sea supported by Sea Training Pacific Staff to allow maritime units to shake off the cobwebs and get used to the environment.

"It's really a challenge to maintain an accurate maritime picture," said Capt(N) Couturier. "We focused on basic communications, picture compilation, rules of engagement, and training for port security and boarding parties.'

This week, training will shift from scripted to free-play with a series of scenarios and injects that will test the maritime component's ability to assist the RCMP with neutralizing potential threats.

"We have regular force and reserve sailors from across the country involved in Exercise Silver. We are supporting the RCMP, which is responsible to provide security for the Olympics using a pan-navy approach," said Capt (N) Couturier.

## Air Component Commander

During the Olympics, the air component, led by Colonel Bill Veenhof, will provide aviation mobility and air surveillance support to the RCMP-led Integrated Security Unit and the other Component Commanders, while maintaining search and rescue responsibilities.

Air assets will include Buffalo and Aurora fixed wing aircraft, Griffon, Sea King and Cormorant helicopters, and their respective air crews from CF bases across Canada.

Colonel Veenhof says the Air Component will provide mobility to the RCMP Response Teams, something not normally accomplished and that will require dedicated training for both the RCMP and helicopter aircrew.

Exercise Silver allows air crews to experience the full spectrum of planning and flight operations in the same weather conditions expected for the Olympics. This exercise includes joint operations with the RCMP and NORAD. NORAD will focus on exercising its mission during Ex Silver and their operations will include the use of CF-18 fighter aircraft. The Air Component's Command Centre will be in the combined ISU/JTFG command centre in Richmond.

## Land Component Commander

Soldiers on the ground during the Olympics and Paralympics will be under the command of Colonel Andre Corbould.

Their primary role is patrol, surveillance and reconnaissance in both the Whistler and Vancouver

Around-the-clock, the army will patrol various Alpine venues throughout the Area of Operations, plus provide mobility support to the RCMP-led Integrated Security

"We hope to be doing joint patrols with them as opposed to operating on our own, because we are working with them hand-in-glove at all the venues they've asked us

to support," says Col Corbould. "We will be taking a distinctively low-profile approach to everything we do because we don't want our presence from a security perspective to overwhelm or overshadow the games in any way."

This week, about 50 army headquarters and planning staff are involved in Exercise Silver.

"Exercise Silver is primarily a command post exercise for the land component, so our focus for the exercise will be coordination," he said. "When you start to consider all the municipal, provincial and federal agencies involved, what's important is making sure we coordinate all activities so we know who's doing what and how we can all support each other in the greater aim of securing the

As the games draw closer, soldiers will practice back-country alpine skiing, avalanche safety and rescue training in the Rocky Mountains.

"While we have trained quite a bit for Arctic operations, the Alpine environment is quite different and will require more specific training in these early stages," says the Colonel.

The land component will conduct up to 10 training exercises over the next 12 months to prepare them for the Olympics.

Based out of CFB Edmonton, Col Corbould is the Commander of 1 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group (1 CMBG) from Land Forces Western Area.

Most of the approximately 1,500 soldiers who will take part in Operation Podium in 2010 will be from 1 CMBG units, including 2nd Battalion Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry from Shilo, MB and the Lord Strathcona's Horse Armoured Regiment of Edmonton, and augmented by army reservists from across Canada.

Elements from 39 Canadian Brigade Group, headquartered out of Vancouver, will form subunits and operate in a supporting capacity.

# Canadian waters patrolled by Calgary ADVERTISE

**HMCS** Now that Calgary has delivered the Canadian Rangers to Kitimat, and into the initial leg of their northern trek to Churchill, Manitoba, the frigate has adjusted its course for a journey down Vancouver Island.

Their mission: marisecurity (MARSECPAT).

Part of a Canadian naval ship's duty each year is to further training, to enhance community relations and to provide security and surveillance in Canada's waters.

In Kitimat, the ship took in Junior Canadian Rangers from Port McNeil and Port Hardy for an overnight sail to Prince Rupert. Young Canadians ages 12 to 18 who live in remote and isolated communities can join the pro-

Cameras snapped as the crew completed a man overboard exercise to demonstrate their at-sea rescue skills. The Junior Rangers, dressed in sweatshirts and ball caps, also got the chance to learn first aid and bandaging techniques from the ship's medical team.

"This is a great opportunity for them to see what happens on a navy ship, and this type of exposure may generate more interest among youth to become Junior Rangers when they return to their communities and tell their stories," said Sgt Ray Hockey, Junior Canadian Ranger Instructor.

After disembarking the youth in Prince Rupert, Calgary headed to the outside passage of Vancouver Island for training.

"Exercises such as gunnery, damage control, casualty exercises, engineering drills, and training for the Officer of the Watch are all necessary to maintain the ship's operational readiness," said Cdr Bill Quinn, Calgary's Commanding Officer. "We try to take advantage of every day at sea because we have to keep current with our skills, and will be going to sea again in the spring or early summer."

While at sea, the ship also looks for illegal activities.

"If we saw illegal fishing activity we would call in the Department of Fisheries and Oceans, or if we saw some drug activity we would call the RCMP. said Cdr Quinn. "We also

provide surveillance and act as a standby for search and rescue."

After the ship reaches the southern tip of Vancouver Island it will continue on to Vancouver for a multidepartment exercise led by the RCMP.

During this training, the crew will focus on surveillance techniques and how to deal with potential security threats in preparation for their role of seaside security for next year's Olympics.

This exercise is being done at the same time of year as the 2010 Olympics, so the crew can see traffic patterns in a similar setting to what they'll deal with next year, said Cdr Quinn.

After the week-long exercise, the ship will visit Seattle to show the flag and provide the crew with a little rest and relaxation before it sails back home to Victoria.

# Pink Panther 2 – feast or famine?

Even if you liked Steve Martin in the Pink Panther remake, can he make the role more interesting the second time around? This week in theatres, Martin returns as Inspector Clouseau in The Pink Panther 2. Also debuting this week, Neil Gaiman's Coraline makes its 3D debut, the self-help book He's Just Not That Into You gets a fictional re-imagining, and lastly, the terrible tale of the Montreal Massacre is told in Polytechnique.

## The Pink Panther 2

From the director of *Agent* Cody Banks, Agent Cody Banks 2, and One Night at *McCool's* comes the sequel that should never have been made.

Steve Martin stars, once again, as the ever-bumbling Inspector Clouseau, who is sent away on a "vacation" in France just as the Pink Panther diamond is stolen for a second time. Leading a team of equally inept experts, Clouseau must track down the master criminal before he makes off with more treasures.

Although Martin is an unmistakable comedic talent, even when he's slumming it in films like this, it seems like he has really reached a new low. Even in some of his worst film choices, like Cheaper by the

Dozen, there was a feeling that Martin still had a lot of great work ahead of him.

After Cheaper by the Dozen 2 and the first Pink Panther, it's getting a bit hard to believe he's not stuck in a smoking, burning wreck of a career nose-dive.

## Coraline

In all the world there are few writers who I admire more than Neil Gaiman (aside from Terry Pratchett). Gaiman's stories are consistently intense, moving, and all-together spellbinding in a world of what I can only call mostly mundane.

In this stop-motion animated feature, which is based on Gaiman's Hugo and Nebula award-winning novella, Dakota Fanning voices the part of Coraline, a young girl looking for adventure in what she considers her otherwise dull life. When she discovers a special door, which opens into a parallel world where life is exciting, Coraline may have bitten off more than she can chew.

Directed by Henry Selick, who also brought The Nightmare Before Christmas to the big screen, this is easily my big pick for the








# Investigation concluded, alcohol a factor in crash

The investigation into the car accident at CFB Esquimalt last year has been completed by the Canadian Forces National Investigation Service (CFNIS), an independent unit of the Canadian Forces Military Police.

At 1.30 a.m. on Aug. 14, 2008, a car crashed through a cement barrier at the end of Naden Way and plummeted into Lang Cove. Driver Stephanie Hendel was pronounced dead at the scene. The male passenger was rescued and transferred to hospital. The identity of the passenger will not be revealed as it is protected under the Privacy Act.

Following the investiga-

tion, which included the Coroner's findings, the CFNIS determined the car was traveling at a high rate of speed when it crashed. At the time of her death, Hendel's blood alcohol level was found to be twice the legal limit according to the toxicology report. This was a contributing factor in the accident and her subsequent death, which was determined to be as a result of drowning.

The accident was investigated by the CFNIS, assisted by Victoria City Police and the CFB Esquimalt Military Police Detachment, as the accident occurred within Military Police jurisdiction.

Three Victoria-based Canadian Forces members have been invested with one of the highest honourary awards – the Order of Military Merit.

This order recognizes distinctive merit and exceptional service displayed by men and women in regular and reserve Canadian Forces, and is next in precedence to the Order of Canada.



## **Decommissioned war**ship to be transferred back to DND

The Minister of National Defence has announced Fraser will be transferred back to DND from its current owner, the Artificial Reef Society of Nova Scotia (ARSNS)

Despite the best intentions and best efforts of the ARSNS, the significant scope of maintaining Fraser proved to be beyond the capacity of the Society's resources.

The vessel has been slowly deteriorating over the years. A comprehensive survey of the ship's condition will be conducted. This will be accompanied by remedial work to address any immediate environmental, health or safety risks that are assessed during the survey.

The work will also ensure that the ship is safe to move. The title, custody and liability of Fraser will be transferred to DND immediately before the vessel is moved from Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, to a temporary berth.

DND is evaluating a number of disposal options, including preservation of the vessel for heritage purposes, sinking it to create an artificial reef or disposal as scrap. Fraser has been in Bridgewater, Nova Scotia, as a floating museum since

# A multinational success in Afghanistan

Due to the high elevations and dry conditions, flight operations in Afghanistan have been very challenging for the new Joint Task Force Afghanistan (JTF-Afg) Air Wing in Kandahar.

The Canadian Helicopter Force Afghanistan (CHF(A)) have had their challenges as well, but have managed to lift off without a snag.

Technicians from 408 Tactical Helicopter Squadron based in Edmonton, who are currently serving with the CHF (A), have not only been working on their own aircraft, but have also been lending a helping hand to other Canadian aviation units and other aviation units deployed at the Kandahar Air Field in Afghanistan.

"We have an incredible maintenance facility here at the Kandahar Air Field, and our maintainers are always willing to go that extra step in order to ensure we provide the best service

that we can," said Major Derek Lay, JTF-Afg Air Wing Maintenance Flight Commander. "Anytime we can help other Air Wing units or units from different countries, the interaction and team work between all the air units here makes it all worth while."

The JTF-Afg Air Wing is composed of six CH-147 Chinook D model medium - to heavy - lift helicopters, three CC-130 Hercules aircraft, up to three Heron Unmanned Aerial Vehicles,

and eight CH-146 Griffon helicopters.

"What has been unusually interesting and gratifying is the amount of multinational support that we receive from the United States Army, Marine Corps and the British Joint Helicopter Force. We share our resources on a daily basis, and since the United States Army operates the same Chinook D Model helicopters, we can share our expertise as well it's a multinational success," said Major Lay.







# Sailors await sentencing for damaging computer system

Two female sailors are awaiting sentencing after pleading guilty to willfully damaging a database icon at the National Defence Command Centre (NDCC) in Ottawa

During a court martial that began last Wednesday on base, PO2 Janet Sinclair and her spouse PO2 Silvya Reid both admitted to purposely tampering with a Microsoft Access application, originally created by PO2 Sinclair, which was used to produce briefings to senior officers and defence officials. This database contained classified information on missile launches and space data that was provided by our allies, said LCol Theo Heuthorst, Commander of the National Defence Command Centre.

Both women worked at NDCC as information management non-commissioned members and held security clearances of the highest level, explained LCol Heuthorst during his testimony. "They worked with extremely sensitive and highly classified information."

Prosecutor Maj Jason Samson read in court an email conversation between the two women that provided evidence of them planning to crash the database.

On July 23, 2007, a formal investigation began when LCdr Gavin McCallum, a senior officer working at NDCC at the time, initiated an investigation.

In the statement of circumstances read in court, Maj Samson reported that PO2 Reid confessed that her actions were intended to see if co-workers could return the application to operation

and that she was motivated by a desire to teach other members of the watch a les-

PO2 Reid admitted in court that she had had trouble with two colleagues and felt they weren't doing their job properly. LCdr Gavin McCallum testified that one fellow co-worker was subsequently counseled for her poor performance. "I had no idea the problems got to the level that they did which led to this incident," said LCdr McCallum.

The act degraded the efficiency of the section for two weeks and cost \$536 to repair damage to IT resources said Maj Samson.

"The accuracy and timeliness of the information being transferred [from the database] was affected," said LCol Heuthorst, adding it could have compromised sensitive information that the Canadian Forces holds.

Prosecution asked LCol Heuthorst about publicity on this case will impact the department. "As it became public it called into question the accuracy and timeliness that National Defence Command Centre provides to our allies and senior levels of the Canadian National Defence," he said. "I will need to make a formal apology to our allies and make them aware that this is an isolated event, and not a representation of the department."

PO2 Reid wrote a letter of apology shortly after the incident and before she was charged.

After the internal investigation, both women were initially charged with a number of offences, but mischief to data, willfully damaging property, and negligently

performing a military duty were presented at the beginning of this case. When they pled guilty to willfully damaging property the other two charges were withdrawn.

They were re-assigned to other roles in the Canadian Forces.

At press time Friday afternoon, the case moved into closing arguments, where the defence spoke about what they consider a just punishment. The case is scheduled to continue today.

Court martial judge Col Mario Dutil said the maximum penalty for the crime they have pled guilty to is less than two years in prison.
