

The YAC has found a fantastic way to promote itself to all military and DND family pre-teens and teens by hosting a meet and greet, featuring the local youth band Fatal Injection.

"We want to promote the Youth Activity Centre with something the kids will really enjoy, so we decided to host a concert," said Dan Kivell, the Personnel Support Programs Youth Supervisor. "We hope to make this a more regular kind of thing. The kids love it. The band loves doing it. It's really a win-win for evervbodv."

Kivell first heard about the band through its drummer, Tristan MacMullin, who often hangs out at the YAC.



Drydock ready for long awaited repair

This summer when HMCS Victoria slips from drydock into the open water to begin a lengthy test and trial period, it will leave behind an empty drydock, and an opportunity for Fleet Maintenance Facility (FMF) to do some long overdue caisson repairs.

Normally the caisson, or gate, undergoes regularly scheduled maintenance, but with Victoria being docked for such a lengthy period (five years), this hasn't been possible.

A caisson is a large hollow steel box with internal valves and pumps that allow water to flow through it to flood the drydock.

The process for placing or removing caissons has been the same since its inception more than 100 years ago. A ship moves into drydock, the caisson is floated into place, a portion of it is filled with water causing it to sink, forming a watertight seal. Then water from drydock is pumped out into the harbour, leaving the ship accessible to work crews.

When the time comes for the ship to return to sea, the drydock is filled with sea water through the caisson. The water inside the caisson, which has been holding it in place, is pumped back into the harbour, causing the gate to float to the surface where tugboats latch on and move it out of the way for the ship to exit.

However, for as long as Victoria has been locked in drydock, so has water been locked inside the caisson.

"Being in this length of time it will probably have

some rust involved with it, some growth involved with it. It will be one gooey mess, almost guaranteed," said Bob Brodie, naval architect.

Fearing some level of contamination, FMF is using pumper trucks to remove the water safely and transport it to a treatment facility.

It could take up to six trucks working from both sides of the caisson to remove the water in time to match the rising tide.

"The biggest thing in the docking and undocking process is we have a narrow window of time to do it because of the tides. We need to undock at high tide," explains Brodie. "If we can't get the caisson out before high tide then we'll have to wait until the next day and go through the whole evolution again."

Inside the caisson there are 23 valves, including two gate or dock flooding valves that measure 36 inches in diameter. These two valves slide up and down inside the caisson wall letting water in or out as required. In this case, they must open to flood the drydock. The concern with these valves is that sea growth has built up making them immobile.

'Probably three weeks before Victoria undocks we'll send divers down to test the valves and see if they move," says Brodie. "What that entails is putting a wrench on them and forcing them. We can't do that too early because we may not be able to close them again. It's a one shot deal."

According to Brodie, a cofferdam is being built as a backup in case the main valves don't fully close after the test. A cofferdam is

like a box with no lid. It is placed over the opening where the air is sucked out forming a watertight seal. "If there is any water flowing through, once you throw on the cofferdam it seals itself up," said Brodie.

Once Victoria is gone, the gate will undergo a maintenance period. However, the backup gate that is usually swapped out during such maintenance is currently unusable. Dean Steinke, Project Manager for Base Construction Engineering, said the hull is in good shape, but the 30 to 40-yearold electrical system is not. Age and salt spray have plete replacement.

Unusual purchase at base museum

Anyone who has visited the museum gift shop in the last four months has come face to face with a furry creature which I call Beav.

Beav is a full grown beaver, frozen in time, in the process of cutting down a tree. I believe he was caught by a trapper, since he is missing his front-right paw. Somehow he ended up in a taxidermy shop, where they prepared him for exhibit.

We received Beav from CFS Aldergrove when they moved their staff to CFB Esquimalt several years ago. Last winter the museum relocated its warehouse from Naden to smaller quarters in Dockyard. Among the items I was asked to dispose of was Beav.

I requested permission to try to sell Beav in the museum gift shop. Within a day of being moved into the gift shop Beav became a popular attraction with children and foreign tourists. Hardly a day went by that someone didn't photograph Beav, but nobody seemed to want to buy him. One of my sisters had asked me to buy Beav for her so she could give to a senior's home in Manitoba. Concerned about the cost of moving it to Manitoba, I hoped fate would intervene with a better solution.

The solution came in the form of Tomonori Ueda, a Japanese freelance photographer who visited our gift shop on June 8. He purchased some books and pins and photographed Beav. When paying for his purchases he gave me a Japanese coin with a hollow centre that he called a "fire ring." He said the coin would bring me good luck. By good luck he meant that we would meet again someday.

Fast forward to Thursday. I am in the museum office helping a Spanish model maker and his two American friends look through our photo database in the archives when I get a phone call from Bob Hewitt, a museum volunteer, who wants me to know

that he has just sold Beav. I instantly drop everything I'm doing and ask one of the Americans to grab his camera and follow me. A miracle has just occurred and I need him to take a photo of it. When I get to the gift shop Mr. Ueda is there. He wants a box for the beaver. Nothing I find is big enough. However, SLt Jeffrey Leung is in the gift shop preparing to give an afterhours museum tour. He knows someone who can help. He phones Sgt Mike Lawson at Naval Officer Training Centre who promises to make a crate for the beaver and get quotes for shipping it to Japan for Mr. Ueda. Mr. Ueda will come to the museum on Monday to collect the crate.

Friday morning, Mike arrives at the museum with the beaver crated. He needs me to write a letter to the B.C. Ministry of the Environment so Mr. Ueda can get an export permit for the beaver, so I gave Mike a letter, plus a copy of the sales receipt, and a copy of the museum newsletter that mentions not only why we were selling the artefact but the asking price as well. Mike then phones the Ministry of Environment and I explain to the person at the other end of the line that I don't know who trapped Beav and what this person's trapping license number was. I just want Beav to have a nice home. I am assured they will consider the request, but they want us to track down someone from CFS Aldergrove who can confirm what I say. Someone from CFS Aldergrove had asked me about Beav several weeks earlier. He said he worked in the same building as BIS, so Sgt Lawson promises to follow up on it. CPO1 Dave Bodie was able to track down the history on the beaver. He was hit by a car in the late seventies. The body was recovered by a local resident of Aldergrove and was taken to a taxidermist. The local resident presented the mounted beaver to the Chief and Petty Officers Mess of then CFS Aldergrove to represent

the colony of beavers that share the Aldergrove Radio Receive site with the CF.

Monday arrives. Mike tells me that he has a quote for \$4,800 to ship Beav to Tokyo. I can't imagine anyone paying that, so I go to see Sara Helmeczi at Base Public Affairs to find out if one of the Japanese ships taking part in the fleet review might take Beav to Japan for Mr. Ueda.

Too late. The ships are in the process of departing Esquimalt. Sara suggests Mr. Ueda, take the beaver home with him, as "checked baggage." I return to my office where Mr. Ueda is waiting for me. He is flying back to Japan on Air Canada, so I phone the Air Canada tollfree reservation number. I tell the person who answers that I have one of their customers in my office. This gentleman has just purchased a beaver from our gift shop and he wants to take it home to Japan tomorrow. Can they help him get it there? Yes, they can. The cost will be under \$1,000, but Mr. Ueda will have to check the beaver in with his luggage at the airport. Mr. Ueda agrees, and I arrange for a taxi to take him to Work Point where S/Lt Leung and Sgt Lawson are waiting to finalize the travel arrangements for Beav.


Tuesday. I phone Sgt Lawson for an update. Unfortunately, it is too late to get a photo of the crate for my newspaper article. They delivered Beav in a crate to the airport for Mr. Ueda that morning. Everything went smoothly.

Years from now, when people ask me about the Fleet Review, my thoughts will not be of ships but of my buddy Beav who managed to find a new home thanks to Tomonori Ueda, SLt Jeffrey Leung, Sgt Lawson, Sara Helmeczi, the B.C. Ministry of Environment, Air Canada cargo, and a lucky Japanese coin.



EXPRES Online new booking tool

A new online booking tool called Web EXPRES is making it easier for unit coordinators to book their members' EXPRES tests.

Previously, unit EXPRES coordinators would have to book, cancel and rebook the tests through a fitness and sports instructor at Personnel Support Programs (PSP).

However, this proved a time consuming process because they had to wait for PSP staff to respond with appropriate schedules in order to accommodate the

Now with the new online booking tool that launched June 7, unit coordinators see a schedule with available times and can either book, rebook or cancel EXPRES tests for their members accordingly.

This booking tool is only available for unit coordinators. If members don't know who their unit coordinator is they should phone PSP at 250-363-4485 or 250-363-4412.

This booking method is the new standard and unit coordinators can be self sufficient and should not need to correspond with PSP staff.

"It's really making it a lot easier for the units to accommodate their members," said fitness and sports instructor supervisor Alyssa Hindle. "In the future we hope to use this as a reporting tool to enter in member's EXPRES results to make the reporting and tracking even easier within the same data base."

Only unit coordinators can gain access to this system. "Lots of bases across Canada have been using this and it's great that CFB Esquimalt is on board now," she said.

If any unit coordinators have not heard of this new system they should contact Hindle at 250-363-4412 so she can load them onto the program and grant them access to the system.

Civilian pilots get inside look at rescue centre

A group of 14 Civil Air Search and Rescue Association members (CASARA) from Nanaimo were invited by CFB Esquimalt's Sgt Conrad Cowan of the Joint Rescue Coordination Centre (JRCC) for a tour of the Centre

"CASARA is a volunteer group of civilian professional pilots, airmen and airwomen that aid us in searching for downed aircraft or lost people and also in investigating emergency locator transmitter signals from aircraft that have experienced trouble such as a hard landing," said Sgt Cowan.

Operating in all 13 provinces and territories with access to approximately 375 aircraft and 2,596 certified pilots, navigators and spotters, CASARA volunteers

devote over 188,000 hours a year to help in the aid of others.

As Sgt Cowan explains, "They can produce fantastic eyes and ears capability to the north. Where it takes us time to launch the aircraft, get them airborne and travel all the way into the expanses, these volunteers are already in the area. They are positioned all over our search and rescue region."

With one telephone call to a region's Zone Commander, volunteers are quickly launched into action, getting to their local airport, into their own aircraft, flying in an area they know well. At times, while the JRCC team is transiting to an area, local CASARA volunteers will have the case solved by the time they arrive, or at least pass along detailed information so that when the JRCC team lands they can start making informed

decisions on what types of resources they will need to provide.

"I recently completed a search master course and it really drove home the role of CASARA. They can set up the search headquarters, they already know what hangar space is available, they know what airport will facilitate large military aircraft, where the hotels are, where briefing rooms could be set up, so when we land the phones are set up and the maps are on the wall. They are really a very valuable resource," said Sgt

Mike McKenna, one of the Nanaimo CASARA volunteers, enjoyed the afternoon spent at JRCC. "They are our eyes and ears for selecting areas to search in so we all have an interest in what goes on here. So we're here to meet the people, see the equipment and just get a

feel for the place," he said.
"I knew there was an air section and a marine sec-

tion but seeing how they work together, seeing some of the technology used and just hearing stories from the search and rescue technicians, just the information and the flavor they were able to impart, I learned a lot today. It was really fascinating," said McKenna.





Base barber keeps military stylish

Barbara Arnaud helps the military look good – literally.

With razor sharp scissors in one hand and a small black comb in the other, she keeps the uniformed members' hair well groomed.

Arnaud has been the barber at the Dockyard Barbershop for the past 15 years

"It blew by," she said of her years cutting the hair of military and civilian personnel at CFB Esquimalt.

The day before the May 4 Navy Day, there was a steady flow of customers sprucing up for the parade through downtown Victoria as part of the Naval Centennial. Even before the shop opened, there were members waiting to take a spot in one of the two original barber chairs.

The Dockyard Barbershop is one of the only places in town where you can get a haircut before the workday starts. Arnaud unlocks the door at 7 a.m., before some people have even had their first morning coffee.

"It's good because I'm all done before 8 a.m. and I work at 8 a.m.," said CPO2 Frank Gingras as he waited for his turn in Arnaud's chair.

Within the hour more than a dozen customers had come and gone thanks to Arnaud's dexterity with the scissors and the proficiency of stylist Debbie Bullard, who usually works Fridays.

They see about 100 military members and civilian personnel pass through their front door every week.

"It's not every barber or hairdresser that knows how to give a decent military haircut," said Lt(N) Michael McWhinnie before getting into the barber chair. Every two or three weeks he typically asks Arnaud for a low taper style without the thinning shears.

The building that houses the Dockyard Barbershop was built in the 1940s for officer training. Bob Walls, who was known as Bulkhead Bob, opened the barbershop in the 1960s after he retired from the navy. Paul Molinari took over in the mid 1980s and eventually hired Arnaud as a part-time stylist.

Arnaud, whose father was in the air force, followed in her mother's footsteps by going to hairstyling school. She was a hairdresser for 10 years before working at the base, eventually taking over the shop's full-time operation when Molinari moved away.

"It's a really good place to work," Arnaud says. "Everyone is really friendly."

Except for a new coat of paint, the addition of some wallpaper, an upgraded radio and some new waiting area chairs, the shop still looks as it did during the Second World War. The two ornate barber chairs that remain are working souvenirs of the

past. Arnaud refers to one chair as Star Trek's Captain Kirk's command seat. It even has cigarette ashtrays built into the armrests.

A number of customers who walk through Arnaud's door are regulars. In between running conversations about hockey and the weather, she congratulated regular customer CPO2 Kelly Yerama on the recent birth of his baby.

He has been getting his hair cut here on and off since 1992. There are rare times when he goes elsewhere, but only when he has to, such as on weekends when the Dockyard Barbershop is closed.

"Sometimes you let it go too far and you can't walk into work looking like that," said CPO2 Yerama.

Every so often Arnaud will come across a head of hair that needs extra attention. The experienced stylist has had to get rid of a few mohawks or unnatural dye jobs over the years.

"Or they take the clippers to themselves and there are patches all over. It kind of looks like they're sick or something," said Arnaud. "They thought it was a good idea at the time and then found out that they had to get rid of it."


