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# Sailors lend a hand to Peruvian orphanage

The noise of blaring horns, occasional shouts and the many rattles coming from the worn out bus were a stark contrast to the silence of its passengers. Visiting sailors from *HMC Ships Protecteur* and *Algonquin* were en route to a unique centre for disadvantaged youth on the outskirts of Lima, Peru. With the scenery alternating between the walled compounds of modern homes and what could only be described as shanty shacks, many wondered what to expect.

Centro de Integracion de Menores con Amore (CIMA) was established 15 years ago in a rural suburb just five kilometres from the congested Peruvian capital. The centre was envisioned in 1990 by Jean Louise Lebel, a Canadian-born aid worker and educator. Back then, he was concerned about the plight of young men and boys subjected to drugs and violence, many of whom had been abandoned in Lima's roughest quarter. From its early beginnings providing shelter in a crowded hotel room, the centre has grown to house 90 children and teens, providing food, shelter, and love.

Like many shelters, the complex has experienced financial difficulties and Lebel had to make tough choices; he opted to save on upkeep rather than cut programming or give up

beds. The result has been a number of maintenance issues that have not been addressed. That is, until the Canadian Navy came to visit.

The crews of *Algonquin* and *Protecteur* had expressed interest in finding a community project that could be undertaken during their shore visit. Working through the Defence Attaché at the Canadian Embassy in Lima, CIMA was identified as an agency needing help. On Thursday, Aug. 26, 40 sailors arrived at the site.

All was quiet at first, but the ice broke after introductions and the presentation of soccer balls and a cash donation from the ship's crew. The children provided tours and explanations of their classrooms and activities after which the work was soon underway.

Three main projects were identified: the painting of a large classroom, repairs to a fence line bordering the centre's teaching farm, and the construction of a rock wall. When the work was complete, lunch was served and the volunteers were treated to a vibrant performance by the student's band.

There was a different silence on the return trip. This time, the hard work, the hearty meal, and the hugs of the children as the crew boarded the bus led to a certain serenity as each volunteer relaxed in the knowledge of having done great work for a worthy cause.

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# Ride for Dad brings awareness to base

The roar of more than 100 motorcycles filled Naden as the Motorcycle Ride for Dad made the final stop in its cross country trek on Aug. 29

Ride participants and supporters rolled into the base for dinner and a final celebration of 30 days on the road in support of prostate cancer research and the Military Families Fund.

Decked out in leather, newly appointed Commander Maritime Forces Pacific/Joint Task Force Pacific RAdm Nigel Greenwood entered the base as part of the parade of bikes having joined the ride during a stop at Steve Drane Harley Davidson.

Former Reform Party Member of Parliament Deborah Grey was also dressed for the occasion as she rode in on two wheels.

Base Commander Capt(N) Craig Baines, also came out to show his support for the event. A former motorcyclist, he shared his tale of using oven mitts to warm his hands after being caught in cold weather without gloves. Musical entertainment was

provided by emcee Wayne

Rostad, famous for hosting the CBC show "On the Road Again," and Vancouver performer Alexandria Beck who sang "Oh Canada" as well as three of her own songs.

Local members of the Canadian Army Veterans motorcycle club helped with event set up, take down and escorting the Vanguard riders from Nanaimo to Naden.

A local family who benefitted from the Military Families Fund was there to show appreciation for the ride. LS Rempel's wife Christine had a rare blood disorder and the medication she needed wasn't covered by her health care plan. The Military Families Fund helped pay for her life-saving medicine and the illness is now in remission.

Though the Motorcycle Ride for Dad supported the Military Families Fund this year, its primary role is as "an army of chrome and leather fighting prostate cancer."

"Prostate health is a complex subject that too many men avoid discussing openly," says Base Surgeon Maj Henry Phillips. "That discomfort towards addressing the topic itself and learning about risk factors and early detection methods is the greatest barrier to men making informed prostate healthcare decisions."

According to the Canadian Cancer Society, prostate cancer is the most common cancer in Canadian men. One in seven men will develop prostate cancer during his lifetime and one in 27 will die of it.

"Beginning at age 40, the frequency of scheduled physical examinations for CF members increases from every five years to every two years," says Maj Phillips. "Prostate health then becomes a more prominent concern in the health profile of men.'

Prostate cancer usually grows slowly and can often be cured or managed successfully if detected early.

"Our initial screening method for prostate health in an asymptomatic male is through digital rectal exam (DRE). Screening may also include testing for prostatespecific antigen (PSA) at the discretion of the physician after an informed discussion with the patient. Should a

DRE or PSA reveal abnormal results, then further investigations are warranted such as prostate ultrasound or biopsy," reminds Maj Phillips.

Signs and symptoms of prostate cancer include the need to urinate often, especially at night; an intense need to urinate (urgency); difficulty in starting or stopping the urine flow; an inability to urinate; weak, decreased or interrupted urine stream; a sense of incompletely emptying the bladder; burning or pain during urination; blood in the urine or semen or painful ejaculation.

Many of the same symptoms can be caused by a nonlife threatening prostate condition called Benign Prostatic Hyperplasia.

"If someone is displaying any of these symptoms they should seek proper medical diagnoses," urges Maj Phillips. "The worst possible course of action is to ignore or suppress health concerns. Early detection and treatment just might save your life."

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# Machete a fun blockbuster action film

Debuting this week in theatres: Danny Trejo stars as the tough-as-nails Mexican hero. Machete, and George Clooney plays a hunted assassin in The American.

#### Machete

If you've seen Robert Rodriguez and Quentin Tarantino's Grindhouse, Machete will probably be familiar. Back in 2007 when Grindhouse was released, to give the doublefeature some style, Rodriguez and Tarantino created fake trailers for the kind of films that you would expect to see at your average b-movie cinema of yesteryear. The idea came from the days when Rodriguez was making Desperado though, and from the start the writer and director always had Danny Trejo in mind to play this contentious action hero.

Wooing the ladies, killing the bad guys, and never looking back, Machete is a tough Mexican ex-Federale who got burned by a druglord named Torrez, played by Steven Seagal. We catch up with Machete on the streets of Texas where he works as a day labourer until one man picks him up to kill a corrupt, loud-mouthed politician.

Michael Booth, played by *Lost's* Jeff Fahey, hands Machete \$150,000 to kill Senator McLaughlin, played by Robert De Niro, but Machete doesn't realize that Booth works for McLaughlin, and is just trying to make a name for the senator and plans to set him up. Of course the senator's aide also doesn't realize that the old Mexican he just hired is actually the famed ex-Federale known as Machete.

When the trap is sprung and Machete goes to take the shot, one of Booth's men appears, shoots Machete, and then shoots the senator in the leg. Machete has to run for his life, which is when he meets up with a number of very interesting characters as he works to get even, and find out who is behind it all.

Co-written by Rodriguez and Alvaro Rodriguez, Machete is a modern day b-movie with lots of blood and explosive action, but it also has a big message about America's immigration laws. The best part of the film though is the countless string of cameos by the likes of Segal, Michelle Rodriguez as Luz, Jessica Alba as Sartana, De Niro, Cheech Marin as Machete's brother Padre, not to mention Lindsay Lohan, Don Johnson, and Tom Savini.

Unlike The Expendables, which wasted its co-stars, Machete knows how to use its stars with hilarious tongue-in-cheek asides and jokes. The film is not for everyone of course. Machete is a hilarious action-comedy built on the heroeis conquests with every pretty woman he meets, and the unique ways he finds to off the bad guys; it safe to say if you didn't love the trailer, you're going to hate the film.

That said, Machete is a little disappointing. The film is simply

far, far too long – at 1 hour and 45 minutes, Machete feels like it needs to hammer you over the head with the immigration message, and the action starts and stops to make time for that. *Machete* is definitely a big screen action film with laughs and great leading ladies, but Rodriguez and Maniquis could have cut a bit out to make this a slicker action movie.

Ultimately though, Machete is just plain fun, and for action junkies, it's a great way to end the blockbuster season.

#### The American

The American makes me wonder if George Clooney's star is starting to fade.

Normally, Clooney's films get some serious fanfare before they're released, but *The* American was quietly dumped into theatres on a Wednesday and is getting the kind of reviews you'd expect from far lesser stars.

Clooney stars as Jack, an assassin on a break in the Italian countryside after his last job in Sweden didn't end quite as planned. Befriending a local priest, and falling for a local woman, Jack takes the job of building a special gun for one of his contacts. His problem is that someone is coming for him and he doesn't know who to trust, or who might be watching him.

The film has been getting a few notable reviews, but most reviews have not been kind. Colin Covert of As

Minneapolis Star Tribune wrote, 'The American strains so hard to be European - a slower, more intellectual cloak-and-dagger melodrama - that it winds up feeling Canadian: more bloodless and chilly than thrilling."



# 442 Sqn helicopter crew receive international award

Five search and rescue helicopter crewmembers from 442 Squadron in Comox will travel to London, U.K., this fall to receive a prestigious award recognizing their devotion and courage during a dangerous glacier rescue on April 24, 2009.

In a ceremony at Guildhall on Oct. 21, Sgt Kent Gulliford, Maj Jason Von Kruse, LCol Christian Lalande, Cpl Dominic Frenette, and MCpl Billy Ternes will receive the elite Prince Phillip Helicopter Rescue award, presented by the Guild of Air Pilots and Air Navigators.

"This award represents the work of search and rescue as a whole," says mission team leader Sgt Kent Gulliford. "Many heroic and lifesaving missions have been undertaken that had far greater risk, less certain outcomes, and far less fanfare. So I will be thinking of my fellow SAR air crew, and fellow SAR Techs in particular when I receive this prestigious award."

The 2009 rescue began

with a mountain climber's worst nightmare. A challenging multi-day ski mountaineering excursion across the Homathko Glacier near Comox took a turn for the worst for a party of three when one man fell into a deep crevasse.

The other two men tried to help their injured friend who was trapped 30 metres below, but were physically, mentally and emotionally exhausted and needed help.

Cormorant 902, with assistance from Buffalo 457, was tasked to respond to the call.

"Like many missions, the information we received did not fully prepare us for the situation on scene. We were led to believe there was a large and wellequipped climbing party, and we expected to find things well in hand when we arrived. However, once on scene it became apparent the actual situation was much different," said Sgt Gulliford.

The two climbers on the glacier didn't have much strength left and were hoisted into the helicopter. They reported they low-

ered themselves into the crevasse and tried to resuscitate their friend. While his colour improved, they were unsuccessful.

Flight Engineer Cpl Dominic Frenette was asked to use hoist techniques seldom practiced to lower Sgt Gulliford down into the crevasse, which was about three metres wide.

"At an elevation of 2,650 metres, hovering was very difficult and the darkness and featureless snowy terrain made finding a hover reference challenging," said Sgt Gulliford.

"Executing a high angle rope rescue with just myself - while it's a scenario that we practice - was not one I relished," he said.

Sgt Gulliford strapped crampons on in preparation and clomped around the helicopter as he prepared to be lowered.

"The biggest challenge was facing a technical ice rescue at night with little support," he said.

The steep mountainous terrain did not permit efficient use of flare illumination from the Buffalo aircraft on scene and the crew's night vision goggles

were hampered by the lack icy well, about 30 metres of light.

"I relayed commands via radio as I was being lowered into the crevasse because I wouldn't be in view of the engineer for much of the evolution. I told them that if they didn't hear from me to pull me up. Then I just started a cadence into the radios so they would anticipate hearing me in a certain rhythm, down, down, down. Every once and again I said stop just to be sure they were paying attention. There was an overhang, and I basically just dropped down into an

down."

Once at the bottom of the crevasse Sgt Gulliford 37-year-old located Johannes Meuller, a doctor and member of North Shore SAR, and attached the double lift harness he had taken with him to extract him to safety.

Slowly the two men were raised up the cable and into the helicopter. The crew attended to injuries and alerted St. Joseph Hospital in Comox they were transporting the injured man who was still unconscious.

This is the second time Sgt Gulliford will walk between the medieval walls of Guildhall. In 2007 he received the Prince Phillip Helicopter Rescue award for his actions in rescuing three men who were involved in a helicopter crash. This latest honour makes him the international award's only double winner in its 22 year history.

Sgt Gulliford is now posted to 103 Rescue Squadron in Gander, NL.

Despite this heroic lifesaving effort, Meuller was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital.



# Behind the scenes: a photographer's Snowbird experience

Only a chosen handful of Canadians get to experience flying with Canada's Air Demonstration Team. Photojournalist Mike

Sroka is one of the lucky few.

He spent five years soaring with and documenting the excitement of the Snowbird team air shows, the challenge of life on the road, and most notably he experienced countless heart-stopping full aerobatic performances with his camera.

Now he's bringing his experiences to Victorians in a special presentation on Sept. 18 from 2 to 4:30 p.m. at Camosun College.

This artistic multimedia presentation gives a bird's eye view of training, travelling and flying with the Snowbirds.

"This presentation is the first of its kind," says Sroka. "The general public will be treated to a personal look at the team that has never been done before. They will see what it's like to try out for the team, learn about the intense training, discover the challenges of taking the show on the road, and meet some of the pilots and their families."

The presentation is a mix of lectures supported by still photos, a multi-media slide show and a short video. "It is also a look at



both the process of getting a book deal and becoming a part of the Snowbird family," says Sroka.

Additionally, it looks at air shows in general and examines North America's other military aviation teams the Blue Angels and the Thunderbirds.

"It would be of interest to Snowbird fans, aviation enthusiasts, photographers, writers, pilots and members of the general public that are simply curious," he said.

His book *Snowbirds: Behind The Scenes With Canada's Air Demonstration Team* covers Snowbird teams of 2003 - 2005 with updates from 2006 and 2007, and looks at both the show team and the Moose Jaw, SK, home team.


"One of the conditions of the book deal was that no door be closed," he said. Because of this, Sroka experienced the full deal during his various encounters.

He describes flying with the Snowbirds like no other experience a photographer could go through. "People always compare it to a roller coaster, but it's definitely a bit more. You are constantly changing directions, flying upside down, and pulling up to five Gs takes its toll on your body. Add a camera and photography to the mix and you can see where it becomes a very challenging photo environment," he says. "As for the fun factor, it's hard to find anything that compares to flying military aerobatics surrounded by planes basically a few feet away."

His most memorable photo flight was with the schooner Bluenose II off Peggy's Cove. "Combining the timings of three at speed subjects - the Bluenose II, the Snowbirds squadron, and my chase plane - made for the most challenging photography of my 20-plus year career," said Sroka.

"Although I had a bit of a reputation as one of North America's 'high energy' photographers, my flying experience prior to the Snowbirds was basically limited to the coach section of major airlines. Snowbirds: Behind The Scenes With Canada's Air Demonstration Team was published at a time when no one was doing hard cover coffee table books. I think people will find the process of 'crazy idea to published book' worth the price of admission," he said.

The last race of the 2010 63 RCSCC Kalamalka in Vernon.



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# "RCN 100th Anniversary Ships Decanter"

his exceptionally beautiful, one-liter ceramic ship's decanter has been commissioned to commemorate the Royal Canadian Navy's 100th Anniversary. Fewer than 6,000 have been produced. A donation of \$5 from the sale of each decanter is being given to the Canadian Naval Memorial Trust, which maintains and operates the only surviving Corvette, HMCS SACKVILLE in Halifax. The mission of this non-profit trust is to maintain the 'Last Corvette' in her 1944 configuration as Canada's Naval Memorial to all those who served in the naval service.

This decanter has been hand cast from porcelain, and hand decorated using glass colored inks, not plastic, that have been permanently fired into the ceramic at temperatures approaching 1600° Fahrenheit. It will provide more than a lifetime of service without any degradation to those who appreciate fine and unusual objects.

Of special mention is the bottom of the decanter's base, on which most every RCN ship that was

commissioned over the past 100 years is listed in alphabetical order, more than 300 ships in all. If you served, your ship or ships should be on there.

All of the decanter's decorative elements are of historical significance. Encircling the neck are the 13 Provincial and Territorial Flags.

One of the main cameos on the shoulder depicts HMCS SACKVILLE (K181). Commissioned in 1941, she was one of more than 120 Corvettes built for the RCN during WW II. She saw heavy action from 1941 to 1944, and is the last surviving Corvette.

The adjacent cameo, to the right of SACKVILLE, salutes the Merchant Navy with a painting of the FORT WALLACE. She was one of the Fort Ships that carried vital supplies on perilous voyages to the Allies throughout the Second World War.

The third cameo, "READY, AYE READY" - the RCN's motto - is backed up by the White Ensign of World War II on the one side, and Canada's national flag on the other.

The final cameo, composed of maple leaves and Leviathans, quotes Churchill on the importance of winning the Battle of the Atlantic. Here the RCN played a vital and major role

in its victory at a very high cost of ships and men. If that battle had been lost, so might the war in Europe.

The blue ribbon surrounding the base lists the Seven Seas in Latin.

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

# Navy flag reaches new heights

Over the period of Aug. 22-26, three members of *HMCS Oriole's* core crew hiked through Strathcona Park and scaled Vancouver Island's tallest mountain, the Golden Hinde.

This is the second attempt by LCdr Erik James, commanding officer, and PO1 Ken McEvoy, the ship's coxswain. An attempt was made last year, but the team was turned back on summit day by severely inclement weather. It was the first attempt by MS Jason Clarke, who joined Oriole this summer as the ship's engineer, thereby earning him the honorific title of "Lucky."

The crew are all avid outdoorsmen, as is fitting with a ship that has no covered helms position and all lines are managed "handraulically", meaning there are no winches or powered In 100 hours, the team covered 60 kilometres of mountainous terrain and ascended a total of 5.5km.


devices to aid in sailing the ship.

This expedition complemented the sea-going experiences of the team, as it too was outdoor, archaic in its living conditions, and physically demanding, but in a terrestrial environment.

The expedition was conducted under the auspices the adventure training program as outlined in DAOD 5031-10 and MARPACORD 9-58, with the specific goals of challenging *Oriole's* team physically and mentally, developing teamwork in a unique and demanding environment, and validating and increasing physical fitness levels, as well as displaying the Naval Centennial Flag from the highest point on the island that is home to the Pacific Fleet.

In 100 hours, the team covered 60 kilometres of mountainous terrain and ascended a total of 5.5km. Without exception, each team member felt this was the most physically demanding adventure they had undertaken, but were equally unanimous in stating it was one of the most rewarding challenges they had completed.

In all regards, this was a mission success.



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



# Canadian soldier dies after IED attack


He serving was with the 1st Battalion, The Royal Canadian
