New fire hall breaks ground

Friday Last Base Commander Capt(N) Craig Baines met with Minister of State for Sport and Member of Parliament for Saanich-Gulf Islands Gary Lunn, and President of Preview Builders International Randy Regier for a ceremonial ground breaking at the site of the future CFB Esquimalt Fire Hall and Emergency Operations Centre.

At the Esquimalt Road and Sturdee Street location, with shovels in hand they got down to the task of the ceremonial sod turning.

Capt(N) Baines said, "It's great to see this project underway to support ourselves and the community. The ability to have an emergency operations centre in a post earthquake environment is a real asset."

Minister Lunn was also excited and jumped on board of the excavating machine for a photo op. "The current fire hall is spread across multiple buildings and this new facility will address this shortfall and replace the existing, small and antiquated fire hall."

The \$18.5 million contract for the new fire hall and emergency centre was awarded Oct. 4 to Preview Buildings International Inc. of Chilliwack, B.C. Significant economic benefits and employment opportunities for the region are expected with approximately 100 direct employment opportunities.

This infrastructure proj-

ect was first announced by the Minister of National Defence on Sept. 8, 2010.

The new facility has been designed to be operationally sound in the event of an earthquake, will include five drive-through bays for emergency vehicles and provide additional space for training activities. A second contract for the follow-up phase which involves the demolition of the old fire hall and environmental remediation of the site within the Dockyard will be awarded at a later date.

The new fire hall is scheduled to be open in early 2012.



Inter-ship Grey Cup wager benefits charities

The Montreal Alouettes lived up to Bachman-Turner Overdrive's halftime performance by "Taking Care of Business" in the 98th Grey Cup last Sunday.

Braving the deep freeze that enveloped Edmonton's Commonwealth Stadium, the Alouettes defeated the Saskatchewan Roughriders 21-18.

With the win, Montreal not only retained bragging rights for a team and a city, but two naval warships.

HMCS Regina and Regina's Naval Reserve Division HMCS Queen challenged HMCS Montreal and Montreal's Naval Reserve Division HMCS Donnacona to put up \$250 to be donated to a charity in the winning city. With Montreal taking the cup, \$1,000 has been donated to Hospital Sainte-Justine, a children's

hospital. This is the third year a "wager" of this kind has taken place between Canadian naval ships. In 2007, Regina and Queen challenged HMCS Winnipeg and Chippawa when the Roughriders squared off against the Blue Bombers for the title. And it was only last year when they challenged Montreal and Donnacona for the first time as the Roughriders and Alouettes battled it out for the 2009 title. Unfortunately for

Saskatchewan, recent years have wielded the same result.

Prior to this year's game, it was also agreed the losing frigate, *Regina*, would fly the Grey Cup champion's flag for one week, while the Commanding Officer of the losing Naval Reserve Division, *Queen*, wear an Alouette jersey on a subsequent training night.





NBRIEF Parental leave period extended

The amount of time a deployed member has to use his or her parental leave has been amended.

Previously members had only 52 weeks to use their parental leave, but this has now been extended to 104 weeks.

This change will allow deployed members whose jobs are an imperative military requirement, a greater opportunity to use their parental leave and spend time with their newborn.

Parental leave entitles parents to 364 days (119 for maternity and 245 for parental, which can be split or shared between both parents.)

Shaun Ferri, the Maternity and Parental Advisor at CFB Esquimalt, stated, "It's fantastic to see policy amended and improved to support the troops and give them additional opportunity to take parental."

The Royal Canadian Naval Benevolent Fund (RCNBF) helps to relieve the distress caused by illness, accident or other misfortunes by providing loans or grants to people who are in need of financial assistance. Those eligible for assistance include former members of the naval forces of Canada; serving and former members of the Canadian Forces

In addition, a bursary program for dependant children attending college, university or a vocational institution may be available if other options such as government loans have been exhausted.

The Fund is maintained by donations from serving and ex-service personnel, civilian friends and naval organizations, as well as investments. Eligibility for a loan or grant through the Fund is determined on an individual basis.



Mo Bros join forces in HMCS Brandon

During the month of November, a passer-by might have performed a double-take at the proliferation of moustaches donned by the men of *HMCS Brandon's* ship's company. One might have wondered if the style that lost its appeal in the 1990s had made a comeback.

The real drive behind these handlebars is awareness of a disease that one in six of these moustachioed men may face in their lifetime: prostate cancer.

Movember started in 2003 as a simple challenge to grow a moustache over the month of November

between friends in Melbourne, Australia. These "Mo Bros" soon realized the attention the moustaches drew could be applied to good use. In 2004, Movember hit the internet as a campaign to raise awareness of prostate cancer. Shortly thereafter, many countries, including Canada, were sporting a mo' (slang for moustache).

This year, LS Tamas Kallai led the charge for *Brandon* by proposing and organizing the event, which saw 15 willing upper lips rise to the challenge. Each contestant pledged a minimum of \$5 to be donated to the Prostate Center of Canada for a chance to grow an impressive moustache.

As November drew to a close, Brandon's Coxswain, CPO2 F. Madill

and PO2 D. Peat - who have sported moustaches all year-round - pledged \$5 for the opportunity to offer their judgement on what they believed to be "Best Mo." Midway through the challenge, a few female members of the ship's company requested the opportunity to participate by determining the "Ladies' Choice."

The final tally after all the pledges and donations were received totalled \$157. The winner of "Best Mo'" was LS S. McRae, and "Ladies Choice" to LS C. Brandle. While November has passed, and many an upper lip feel's cooler, LS Kallai and his "Mo Bro's" believe the *Brandon* crew have done their part to raise awareness for a serious disease.



Canadian Voices is a collection of personal, inspirational stories and photos from 70 well known Canadians.

As the book hits the shelves of Chapters, Wal-Mart and the world of cyberspace through Amazon.ca, it is also being sent to the troops in Afghanistan.

Å shipment of 2,500 copies is in transit and should arrive before Christmas.

"These stories will be great reading for the Canadian Forces members," said Brad Barnes, who co-published this book along with spouse Diane Baker. "We hope the troops will enjoy this true gift from Canada. It's a feel good, uplifting, positive book."

The book asks well known Canadians the question: Who has caused you to be the person you are today and what has inspired you?

"These are personal stories from the heart, and these people have put a lot of thought into answering them," he says.

The book features Prime Minister Steven Harper, Celine Dion, Rick Hansen, Lloyd Robertson, Scott Niedermayer, Johnny Reid, David Suzuki and many others.

It retails for \$23.95 with \$3 of each book going to the Make-a-Wish Foundation of Canada.

"This children's charity grants kids with life threatening conditions or those who are terminally ill a wish they dream of like going to Disneyland or meeting a hockey star like Wayne Gretzky," said Barnes.

The story that sticks out most in the publisher's mind is the one of horse racing legend Ron Turcotte.

"He was a Triple Crown jockey who rode Secretariat and his story is about his love for horses. He actually fell out of an attic onto a horse and from that moment on it was hard to get him off. It talks about his success as a jockey and then about the riding accident that left him in a wheelchair. It's his attitude that I find so inspiring, and he is so positive about the prosperous life he maintains.

"I think people will enjoy reading this book and have a greater understanding of what inspired them and more insight into who they are," adds Barnes.



Bateman always drawn to nature

People often ask me "How long have you been a naturalist and how long have you been an artist?" My answer is that I have always been an artist and a naturalist, however there is nothing special about that.

All little kids love doing art and are interested in nature. However, most normal human beings "grow up" around the age of 12 or 13, and give up the "little kid" stuff. That is when I got serious. From the age of 12 I went home from school and did art or I played in the ravine below our back yard in Toronto. I had my first bird list at the age of 12. The innocent charm of children's art seldom lasts past the age of 10, when art of the mind is replaced by art of the eye. It is then that young people become self critical and say "I can't draw." There is no reason why they should be artists, their talents may lie in hockey or dance or elsewhere. However, it is a great pity that an interest in nature is abandoned by the majority of adolescents. For all of human history young people have played around outdoors, but the last decade or so kids are spending their time staring at electronic screens. The lack of outdoor activity is leading to an increase in obesity, attention deficit disorder, depression and substance abuse.

At the age of 80 I still think of myself as a 17 year old kid. I have a vivid memory of my 17th birthday, the 24th of May, 1947. My two buddies, Al and Don, and I hopped on our bikes and rode out in the country to the northwest of Toronto. We discovered a red-tailed hawk nest in a huge white pine in an undeveloped wood lot. It was a bit tricky and dangerous but we climbed up to the nest and discovered two small, white fuzzballs of babies. Disturbing a bird's nest is something we perhaps should not have done, and the parents were a bit unhappy. However, after a few moments we left them in peace. On that same day we also found a killdeer with a baby and I identified the song of the Blackburnian warbler. One of my most precious possessions is the page from my sketchbook with the drawings I did that day. It is a little time capsule of that precious day in May.

It is difficult for me to pick one inspiration. It truly would be a lifetime of countless precious moments with which nature has surprised me.









Charles Brown, the navy's Manager of Broadcast Media Production, was involved with the production at every stage and watched edited cuts at key stages of post-production to ensure accuracy.

'The production team that made 'Convoy' was very strong," he says. Kerr takes command: Like father, like son

Being promoted to the rank of Commander and taking command of a warship is a milestone for any naval officer. Add the prestige that comes with taking

over the fleet's flag ship, HMCS

Algonquin, it's an opportunity not lost on Cdr Tim Kerr.

Last week, he took command during the traditional change of command ceremony onboard the ship. Making the occasion especially rewarding was the presence of his father, Col (Ret'd) Alexander "Sandy" Kerr, who sat in the audience. The senior Kerr served in a past

generation of Algonquin more than 30 years ago. "He was a Sea King pilot, he

joined the service in the 1960s when it was still naval aviation," explains Cdr Kerr. "He went through Venture when it was

in the Dockyard, went to Royal Roads Military College, and wore the navy uniform up until integration; when they did unify the forces they switched all pilots to the Air Force. Throughout his flying career, he served on many ships, including *Algonquin*, where he was the Sea King Detachment Commander."

Between the summers of 1978 and 1979, Col (Ret'd) Sandy Kerr, then a Major, deployed with Algonquin on tours off the coast of Norway with NATO forces, and exercises in the Caribbean. And while Cdr Kerr was only 10 or 11 at the time, he still remembers the stories told to him about the ship. Stories he's now reminded of as he takes command.

"He said it [*Algonquin*] was one of the best, if not the best, ship he served on. He said they had a great cast of characters and he has no doubt the cast of characters on the [current] *Algonquin* is going to be just as good."

For Cdr Kerr, taking over the captain's chair on the ship's bridge was an uncertainty a year ago.


In 2009, he was sent overseas to staff college at the U.K. Defence Academy in England. Just two months into the course, he suffered a serious injury – dislocating his hip and fracturing his pelvis - as a result of a training accident at a British Army Training Facility. Healing quickly from such an injury and being able to finish his courses is largely due to the constant support of friends and family.

"My wife, Anne, not only had to immediately take care of me, but over the course of my rehabilitation she had to take up the extra burden with the kids, and made sure I got what I needed in order to finish my courses. My parents also flew over to the UK from PEI to help look after me. With all of the support I received I was able to get back on my feet and overcome many large obstacles. This experience really brought home to me how important it is for sailors to have that kind of support, both from our families at home and from our family onboard the ship."

He knows he's inherited a topnotch team.

"Algonquin has a very high level of readiness and an excellent ship's company," he said. "I'm excited and honoured to have the opportunity to work with men and women who share the same vision and values as I do, who look at life as an adventure and who always support each other."

With his father flying in from P.E.I. for the ceremony last Friday, Cdr Kerr was excited to share the beginning of this adventure with him.

"RCN 100th Anniversary Ships Decanter"

his exceptionally beautiful, one-liter ceramic ship's decanter has been commissioned to commemorate the Royal Canadian Navy's 100th Anniversary. Fewer than 6,000 have been produced. A donation of \$5 from the sale of each decanter is being given to the Canadian Naval Memorial Trust, which maintains and operates the only surviving Corvette, HMCS SACKVILLE in Halifax. The mission of this non-profit trust is to maintain the 'Last Corvette' in her 1944 configuration as Canada's Naval Memorial to all those who served in the naval service.

This decanter has been hand cast from porcelain, and hand decorated using glass colored inks, not plastic, that have been permanently fired into the ceramic at temperatures approaching 1600° Fahrenheit. It will provide more than a lifetime of service without any degradation to those who appreciate fine and unusual objects.

Of special mention is the bottom of the decanter's base, on which most every RCN ship that was

commissioned over the past 100 years is listed in alphabetical order, more than 300 ships in all. If you served, your ship or ships should be on there.

All of the decanter's decorative elements are of historical significance. Encircling the neck are the 13 Provincial and Territorial Flags.

One of the main cameos on the shoulder depicts HMCS SACKVILLE (K181). Commissioned in 1941, she was one of more than 120 Corvettes built for the RCN during WW II. She saw heavy action from 1941 to 1944, and is the last surviving Corvette.

The adjacent cameo, to the right of SACKVILLE, salutes the Merchant Navy with a painting of the FORT WALLACE. She was one of the Fort Ships that carried vital supplies on perilous voyages to the Allies throughout the Second World War.

The third cameo, "READY, AYE READY" - the RCN's motto - is backed up by the White Ensign of World War II on the one side, and Canada's national flag on the other.

The final cameo, composed of maple leaves and Leviathans, quotes Churchill on the importance of winning the Battle of the Atlantic. Here the RCN played a vital and major role

in its victory at a very high cost of ships and men. If that battle had been lost, so might the war in Europe.

The blue ribbon surrounding the base lists the Seven Seas in Latin.

This Decanter is certainly a fitting tribute to all of those who served over the past 100 years in both the RCN and the Merchant Navy, and to those who still serve today in the cause of freedom.
