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Canada Post recognizes PPCLI with centennial envelope

In a well-attended gathering in the Naval Officer Training Centre (NOTC) Venture gunroom, Canada Post honoured the history of Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI).

To celebrate the regiment's 100th anniversary, a special edition envelope was launched. It commemorates the contributions and sacrifices made by members of the PPCLI.

The unveil date was chosen because March 17 is the birthday of Princess Patricia, after whom the infantry was named. She was Queen Victoria's granddaughter and the youngest daughter of Prince Arthur, who was Governor General of Canada.

"Canada Post is honoured to pay homage to PPCLI with this commemorative envelope on a day as significant as today," said Kevin Pearson of Canada Post, who was on hand to make the presentation. "We believe it is a fitting way to honour the regiment, marking its 100 years of service, and believe it will bring the regiment's proud and illustrious history to homes across the country."

A historic photo spans the length of the envelope, recalling the "Pats" early days with a placing of a wreath on the Regimental colour in February 1919. A row of images along the bottom capture the Regiment's participation in the First and Second World Wars, the Korean and Afghanistan conflict, and a peacekeeping mission in Cyprus. The cancel mark features the letters and coronet from Princess Patricia's royal cypher. The Princess's two first names, Victoria Patricia are visible on both the stamp and the cancel shown as "VP".

On the backside is a synopsis of the regiment's history.

"This small gesture is part of the larger gratitude felt by Canadians everywhere," said Pearson. "Anything we can do to recognize the service provided by regiments like the PPCLI, especially after a century of service, is a definite priority." From the Second World War to conflicts in modern theatres across the globe, the Patricia's are there, working, helping, and even giving their lives in service to Canada and the principles for which it stands.

Judith Guichon, Lieutenant-Governor of British Columbia, helped unveil the envelope. She spoke to those assembled on the pride Canadians feel for the regiment, and the contributions they made and continue to make today.

"For the last 100 years, the Patricia's have been present across Canada, and the world, contributing to making the planet a better place," she said. "From the Second World War to conflicts in modern theatres across the globe, the Patricia's are there, working, helping, and even giving their lives in service to Canada, and the principles for which it stands. It isn't something we forget, and hopefully we are able to show you, even in some small way."

LGen (Ret'd) Ken Foster of the PPCLI took the podium to thank Canada Post for its contribution, and the respect shown in the gesture.


"What we do, and have done for the past 100 years, has been for Canadians," he said. "To know we have the respective and gratitude of those we have spent so long seeking to serve and protect is a great honour. As times goes on we will continue to give our all protecting the country and people we love so much."

Canada's legacy in Afghanistan will remain

As the flag lowered in Kabul after a 12 year presence in Afghanistan, the last round of troops deployed on Operation Attention prepared to come home.

"I am proud to be the last Canadian commanding our troops in Afghanistan as we get ready to bring the troops home. It has been an honour and a privilege and I have been extremely proud to be leading our great Canadians," said Major General Dean Milner, the commander of the Canadian Task Force known as the Canadian Contribution to NATO's Training Mission in Afghanistan.

Canadian soldiers have been present in Afghanistan since 2001 starting with Operation Apollo and then Operation Athena. Afghanistan was Canada's largest military deployment since the Second World, with more than 40,000 Canadian Armed Forces members deploying between 2001 and 2013.

"We did see huge improvements in the development side: we've built a number of schools; we constructed a large number of roads. It's outstanding to see because those roads and schools are everlasting," added MGen Milner.

Since the end of combat operations in Afghanistan in 2011, Canada has assisted in the training, mentoring and developing of the Afghan Nation Security Forces (ANSF). The goal was to prepare them to shoulder the responsibility for their own nation's security.

"I have seen outstanding improvement, night and day, in the change of Afghan Security Forces; and our Canadians have been a huge part of that. I am convinced the [ANSF] can defeat the Taliban," said MGen Milner.

MGen Milner plans to return to Afghanistan with his wife for a visit in the future. He is optimistic he will see a brighter future for the Afghan people.

"If you look at 12 years ago the country's infrastructure had been destroyed and more than 10 per cent of the population had been killed. Approximately one third of the population had fled the country. Now, eight million students are in school," said MGen Milner. "But they are absolutely going to need continued international support and good leadership because they are in a difficult part of the world. They have a chance but it will be up to them."

A presidential election will be held in Afghanistan on April 5.

Navy contribution to Afghanistan mission profound

As Canada's military mission in Afghanistan formally concludes, I wish to commend the men and women of the Royal Canadian bat defence and escort to the retired, for their contributions, accomplishments and sacrifices in supporting this 12-year-long truly national effort, which has played such a profound role in shaping the inherently joint and integrated Canadian Armed Forces of this 21st century.

It was an operation in which the RCN figured from the start. A Canadian task group was dispatched to the Indian Ocean in the days immediately following the attacks on North

America in September 2001, to find themselves assigned responsibility to provide vital sea com-Ready Group, from which U.S. marines originally deployed into Kandahar airport.

For much of the next 12 years, a Canadian task group or frigate was deployed to the theatre. They escorted American Carrier Strike Groups that provided much of the close air support so vital to ground operations in Afghanistan, or more recently the interdiction patrols that denied the sea to the adversary and disrupted the narco-trafficking supply chains, which the adversary was using, and continues to use, to fund operations.

Through 30 deployments – and Navy (RCN), both serving and Bataan and Peleliu Amphibious counting, as HMCS Regina is forward deployed today to continue the effort – the RCN has proved itself as one of the world's finest navies.

Ashore, many of you deployed into Task Force Afghanistan boots on the ground, inside or outside the wire - most notably from our two Fleet Diving Units, whose irreplaceable competencies played a key role in the IED forensics effort that was central to the safety of our personnel on mounted and foot patrols.

Sadly, in the year of our naval centennial, one of them, Petty Officer Second Class Craig Blake, made the ultimate sacrifice in service to our nation.

More recently, auring Operation Attention, sailors have played an important role through the training of Afghan security services.

In all, some 1,337 sailors saw duty in Afghanistan, making a difference in the ordinary lives of the Afghan people and setting the conditions for the longterm peace and stability of that country.

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IDs will be checked at all base entry control points

On any given weekday, about 1,800 people pass through the main gate of HMC Dockyard.

These people are a mix of military members, civilian employees, contractors, visitors and delivery personnel.

everyone However, who wants entry to HMC Dockyard, whether on foot or in a vehicle, must be cleared through an Entry Control Checkpoint.

Checkpoints are usually by manned Commissionaires. They require that personnel seeking entry into the Dockyard, or any other Controlled Access Zone, provide to them a valid photo ID.

Recently, there has been a slight change to the way ID is checked.

Commissionaires now require all personnel to show their ID in a way that enables them to confirm

the expiry date on the document, and visually inspect the photo to confirm the identity of the holder.

ID while slowly driving past the gate is no longer acceptable. Those unable to produce valid identification will be denied access. Although this may slow the flow of traffic, the result is a safer workplace. People are asked to have their ID at the ready prior to arriving at a checkpoint.

Force Protection teams such as Military Police and/or members of the Formation Auxiliary Security Force may conduct random security measures such as vehicle and baggage searches. These random searches of personnel and baggage are authorized under Defence Controlled Access Area Regulations (DCAAR's), which states: As a condition of being

given access to any defence

establishment, every person shall, on the demand of a security guard, submit to a search of his person The practice of flashing or personal property while entering or exiting any such place or materiel or any restricted area within such place or materiel.

Where a person refuses to submit to a search of his person or personal property when required to do so pursuant to Section 11 of DCAAR, the person may:


(a) if the person is seeking entry, be denied access; or

(b) if the person is exiting, have his person and his personal property searched by a security guard who shall use only such force as is necessary for that purpose.



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Ship Repair Zone security tightens

On April 1, defence employees will notice more security at Fleet Maintenance Facility (FMF) Cape Breton.

As the completion of the ship repair zone progresses, security procedures are also progressing.

Building exterior doors that have been left unlocked during the work day will now be locked.

"People use the building as a shortcut, often walking through in their regular street clothes," says CPO1 Douglas Bell, FMF Unit Chief. "But it's an industrial zone. It's dangerous to have people walking in areas with heavy machinery and industrial work being done without the proper protective gear. Changes needed to be made to protect people."

Most exterior doors have been left unlocked to allow easy access for FMF workers, but this has left the building vulnerable to anyone walking around CFB Esquimalt to access these entryways.

"Not knowing who is coming in, where they're going, and what they're doing isn't just unsafe, it's a risk from People use the building as a shortcut, often walking through in their regular street clothes. But it's an industrial zone. It's dangerous. -CPO1 Douglas Bell, FMF Unit Chief

a security perspective," says CPO1 Bell. "There is a lot of material, tools and items that are regulated that we use to maintain the fleet in here. It makes no sense to put the fleet's maintenance at risk for the sake of a few people shaving a minute of time by taking a shortcut through the FMF shops."

The main entrance on the B-Jetty side of the D250 will be the single point of access for visitors to FMF. They must check in with the Commissionaire at the front desk where they will be issued a visitor tag that must be visible at all times.

"Controlling a single point of entry is the only way of keeping track of everyone and ensuring anyone going into the industrial areas has the correct personal protective equipment," says CPO1 Bell. FMF employees will continue to follow their normal protocol.

In the future, additional Commissionaire checkpoints will be added in key spots around dockyard, covering many of the paths to D250 and other FMF facilities.

Along with the fencing off of certain routes and the re-zoning of certain sites, FMF stands to become a much more secure and regulated facility.

"What it really comes down to is keeping people out of places they aren't supposed to be," says CPO1 Bell.

CPO1 Bell acknowledges the changes will come quickly and may be confusing to everyday personnel. He encourages anyone with questions to talk to their supervisors or contact him specifically.

"It's going to be a process and we want to keep people informed," he says. "If everyone is on the same page during the process it will go a lot more smoothly, and we want everyone to work together. It's for the benefit of everyone."

Naden main gate safety is improved

Military Police Unit Esquimalt has noticed an upward trend in the number of incidents involving vehicles or personnel failing to stop at the Naden Main Gate (Naden Way) during silent hours. Silent hours run from 4:30 p.m. to 5:30 a.m. (1630 to 0530 hrs), Monday to Friday and all day Saturday/Sunday during silent hours, personnel must have a valid reason for entry and produce identification that is physically examined by the security guard. In order to prevent accidents, injuries, and public or private damage, vehicles are required to come to a complete stop prior to presenting their identification.

Retention survey requires attention

2014 CAF Retention Survey: We want your input

The retention of trained and experienced CAF personnel is fundamental to operational capability, military professionalism, and efficient personnel management.

As part of the CAF Retention Strategy, Director General Military Personnel Research and Analysis administers a biennial CAF Retention Survey.

The purpose of the survey is to obtain your opinions about your work and the CAF, and to use this information to develop effective retention-related programs and policies. A number of CAF Regular Force members-randomly selected across all occupations-were recently informed they will receive an invitation to respond to the 2014 CAF Retention Survey, which is endorsed by the Chief of Military Personnel.

As such, supervisors are encouraged to support the completion of the survey during work hours, where feasible.

This voluntary survey is web-based and administered through the Defence Wide Area Network.

Completing the survey should take approximately 40 to 50 minutes. Your frank answers to this questionnaire will help senior leaders to identify issues of importance to CAF personnel and focus their efforts to improve these areas and consequently, to increase personnel satisfaction and retention. MPU Esquimalt, in cooperation with POESB and BCE, are implementing several safety measures to improve compliance with ID checks and vehicle stops during silent hours at the Naden gate.

Further, Military Police are being proactive in stopping inattentive or errant vehicles. Vehicles that fail to stop for gate personnel will be identified and stopped by MP personnel, resulting in a possible violation ticket and/or removal from the base. The aim is ensure proper identification of personnel prior to entry while also increasing the safety of pedestrians, Commissionaires, and Base Duty Watch members.

CFB Esquimalt personnel will also notice improvements to the Naden Main Gate, including a red/green traffic light to be erected shortly. This will aid personnel in noting the time in which they are required to stop. Simply put, if the light is green, proceed through at a careful speed, and when the light is red, vehicle traffic must stop and only proceed when directed by base security officials and/ or Military Police.

Other initiatives include repairs to the arm barrier, and a renewed focus on security checks. There is no "right" to enter CFB Esquimalt; it is a privilege and one that can be revoked if abused in accordance one of the following two policies within their individual application:

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

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

As a part of Pacific Women's Day, each participant attends three workshops, hears a keynote speaker and receives a buffet lunch.


