

Navy welcome for Prince Edward

As part of a five day working visit to British Columbia, His Royal Highness Prince Edward, Earl of Wessex, and his wife Sophie, the Countess of Wessex, were welcomed to Government House on Friday afternoon, Sept. 12.

À Royal Canadian Navy (RCN) Guard of Honour was inspected by the Prince, with the Naden Band providing military bravado in the background.

On Saturday, the Prince made a stop at the Wardroom before taking a tour of an Orca class training vessel, while the Countess of Wessex attended community engagements in Victoria.

At the Wardroom, Prince Edward mingled with serving and retired military members, as well as families of the deployed ship's company of *HMCS Regina*. He then left for HMC Dockyard where he boarded Wolf, an Orca-class training vessel. On board, he was greeted by Cmdre Bob Auchterlonie, Commander Canadian Fleet Pacific, and Cmdre David Craig, Commander

Naval Reserves.

After meeting with senior leadership, the Prince enjoyed an in-depth description of the visible RCN infrastructure in Esquimalt Harbour by Cmdre Auchterlonie.

Prince Edward was especially pleased to meet five local Royal Canadian Sea Cadets helping out on the Orca for the day. All of the cadets are recipients of the Duke of Edinburgh Award, a youth award program founded in 1956 by Prince Edward's father, Prince

Philip. Later in the day, 87

from young people Vancouver Island and the Lower Mainland were presented with the prestigious award during a ceremony at Government House by Prince Edward himself. The Award, open to all young Canadians aged from 14 to 24 years, is a non-competitive program in which participants set and achieve personal goals for community service, skills, fitness, and adventure.

After having lunch in the Orca galley, the Earl of Wessex stood on the ship's bridge as it entered Victoria's Inner Harbour.

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

As the Royal Canadian Navy undergoes its most extensive peacetime modernization in history, Vice Admiral Mark Norman, Commander of the Royal Canadian Navy (RCN), announced on Friday the upcoming retirement of four ships that have reached the end of their operational lives.

The ships are HMC Ships Protecteur and Preserver, two Protecteurclass auxiliary oil replenishment (AOR) ships; and HMC Ships Iroquois and Algonquin, two Iroquoisclass guided missile destroyers (DDG). The retirement of these vessels has been anticipated for some time, and is a step towards the introduction of new ships and capabilities set to be delivered through the National Shipbuilding Procurement Strategy (NSPS), as well as recognition of the RCN's commitment to the responsible use of public funds while maintaining Canada's naval readiness.

From the Admiral

The summer has passed quickly and I hope that you each had an opportunity to take some vacation. It has been a busy summer across the Formation as we have continued to deliver on our core missions including ships to sea, SAR, Cadets as well as being prepared to respond as necessary within our JTFP construct.

At the same time, the navy has continued its implementation of the executive plan as we prepare, with energy and excitement, to receive the future fleet of modernized frigates, Arctic and Offshore Patrol Ships, Joint Support preparing the ships Ships and, in due course, the Canadian Surface Combatant.

Yesterday [Sept. 18], I was thrilled to hear the announcement of the name of the first AOPS

HMCS Harry DeWolf. Today [Sept 19], we took another important step in that journey with the Commander of the Royal Canadian Navy's announcement of the plan to decommission HMC Ships Protecteur, Algonquin, Preserver and Iroquois. Each of these ships has served us well for decades and collectively have now reached the end of their operational lives. I am immensely proud of these ships and all who have served in them.

With the announcement, we can now

move forward with the complex work of preparing the ships for decommissioning and eventual disposal. There remains much to be done to ensure that these activities are completed in a deliberate, safe, environmentally appropriate and cost effective manner. At the same time, we will be continuing our ongoing efforts to ensure that the crews of these ships

receive the training and at sea experience necessary for them to advance, as appropriate, through their careers.


As always, significant announcements like this one will lead to rumours and speculation. I encourage you to address any questions/concerns you may have through your chain of command/ management team.

Ladies and Gentlemen - our navy is proud of its 104-year history of operational excellence at home and around the world. As I look ahead to our next 100 years, I am confident that we will continue our proud tradition of operational excellence enabled by the important steps in our transition to the future fleet we are taking now.

Course available on Laws of Armed Conflict

Session 0084, Nov. 18-21. Registration deadline Nov. 7.

Provided by the staff of the Canadian Forces Military Law Centre in Kingston, the Intermediate Law of Armed Conflict (ILOAC) course is designed to provide officers and senior non-commissioned members with a greater understanding of Canada's obligations and their own personal responsibilities under the Law of Armed Conflict.

The course covers the Geneva and Hague Conventions, as well as other international legal instruments and treaties and pertinent Canadian law.

The course is four days

in duration and is normally taught four to five times annually at different bases across Canada, as well as at the Joint Command and Staff Program at the Canadian Forces College, and internationally through the Directorate of Military Training and Cooperation (DMTC).

Members at the Sgt/ PO2 rank and above who are interested in attending this course should request nomination in MITE (Code 114049) through their chain of command or unit training coordinator.

TD funding for applicants without a session in their geographic area is available through CFSTG Borden.

Relocation policy change

DND

The Government of Canada has announced changes to the Intended Place of Residence (IPR) policy for retiring Canadian Armed Forces (CAF) members.

Following a review by the Department of National Defence, the Government of Canada is amending the IPR policy to apply only to members moving outside a 40 km radius within a oneyear period following their retirement.

This change will better align the IPR policy with those of other federal government departments and agencies such as the RCMP. It will also include compassionate exceptions for medical reasons and extenuating personal circumstances.

The IPR policy assists retiring CAF members to return to their hometowns or final destinations following their military service.

This policy covers costs associated with a move including real estate commission, lawyer's fees, brokerage fees, meal reimbursement when travelling, commercial lodging expenses, travel, packaging, and shipping.

KNOW THE NEW RULES 2014 GENERAL LOCAL ELECTIONS THIRD PARTY ADVERTISING

Third party advertising is any election advertising not sponsored by a candidate or elector organization.

If you advertise as a third party from September 30 to November 15 in the 2014 Local Elections, you have new rules to follow under the *Local Elections Campaign Financing Act.*

- You must register with Elections BC as a third party sponsor **before** conducting any advertising.
- You must include your name and contact information on all advertising.
- You must not sponsor advertising by, or on behalf of, a candidate or elector organization.

More information on the new rules is available at elections.bc.ca/lecfa. Registration forms and the Third Party Sponsor Guide to Local Elections in B.C. can be downloaded at the Third Party Sponsors page.

Media outlets **cannot** publish or transmit election advertising on General Voting Day, Saturday, November 15, 2014.

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Ethics survey returns

The 2014 Defence Ethics Survey, now on its fifth iteration and sponsored by the Defence Ethics Programme, was released in September.

The anonymous, voluntary survey will collect input from a random sample of DND and CAF personnel, including reserves. Those chosen to participate have been notified. Why is this survey important?

Ethics is a topic of importance in the CAF, and in DND. As such, the survey is a critical tool that, based on respondent feedback, will guide the development of ethics initiatives and training programs.

In addition, results will assist senior leaders in creating conditions aimed at fostering ethical attitudes and behaviour. Survey results will also contribute to international research collaborations, allowing DND to obtain even more insights from the results, while once more bringing visibility to Defence on the world stage in this research field.

What's new for this year's survey?

This year's survey will measure perceptions of organizational conditions that promote ethical behaviour, with questions such as, "Does your immediate supervisor set a good example in terms of ethical behaviour?"

The survey will also measure ethical risk - the likelihood of defence personnel acting contrary to one or more of the defence standards or values.

And lastly, the survey aims to be user-friendly. It will be possible to submit it from any computer with internet access (hard copy delivery will be available on request). It will also allow users to save a partially completed survey if finishing it all at one time poses a challenge.

Your responses matter! If you were randomly selected to complete the survey, remember that every response matters. We appreciate and value your input, and ask that you encourage your peers and subordinates to complete the survey if selected.

All personnel will be hearing about the results of this important survey.







Venture Class of '64 a long-standing reunion

During the final send off the "students" were joined by LCdr (Ret'd) Norm Anderson, who was an instructor at Venture during their time in the program.


"We were all terrified of him," says Cdr Evans. "He was this great big officer and we were all just cadets. Even now he's pretty intimidating, but it was great to see him."
