Filmmaker documents Vimy 100 commemoration

On April 9, when five First World War replica aircraft soar high above Vimy Ridge marking the centennial of the famous battle, a Canadian film crew will be there to document the moment.

Ottawa producer/filmmaker Tim Joyce of Sound Venture Productions and The Royal Canadian Geographical Society are behind a Department of Canadian Heritage sponsored trilogy of films commemorating the largely unheralded contribution Canadian aviators played in the Allies' victory in the First World War.

As the replica Nieuport 11 biplanes fly over the battle site tiny GoPro cameras affixed to the wings, cockpits and helmets of the pilots will provide what Joyce calls "spectacular coverage of the event." They will also capture the flyover from great vantage points on the ground at the actual ceremony site.

This, along with footage captured with the pilots throughout the Vimy 100 week, will be the final scenes for their third documentary entitled *Flight Path of Heroes*, which is targeted for release November 2017 on the Cable Public Affairs Channel (CPAC).

The *A Nation Soars* trilogy showcases the bravery of Canadian pilots and soldiers who fought in France. The final episode will present the history side to the story, along with a chronology of the commemorative squadron Vimy Flight, who will show off their magnificent flying machines to a crowd of over 20,000.

"A Nation Soars and all its parts is by far the most ambitious project I have ever worked on, and filming the final documentary at this once-in-a-lifetime event is going to be an amazing experience," said Joyce. "Then, seeing Vimy Flight and A Nation Soars return to Canada to start its cross-Canada biplane tour in May will be the icing on the cake. This will not only bring the important message of Vimy 100 home to all Canadians, it will also bring to light a founding moment in our history as we celebrate Canada 150. All in all, I am very proud to be creating a historical legacy that will be passed on to present and future generations of Canadians."

The first two First World War documentaries have already aired on CPAC: *Drawn to Victory* which focused on the importance of aerial reconnaissance, photography and mapping undertaken by Canadians in winning the war, and *Wings* of *Courage*, an in-depth look at the courage and successes of Canadian airmen and their flying machines.

Joyce says the first two parts of the commemorative trilogy have already created important teaching tools for 18,000 educators across Canada networked with the Royal Canadian Geographical Society. A host of innovative educational resources is in distribution, including poster maps, educational videos, feature stories in Canadian Geographic aerial photography kits, and two 8 x 11 metre travelling floor maps (available on request) depicting the Western Front and Vimy Ridge.

The films are also available on CPAC's website, and are narrated in English by Canadian comedic actor Dan Aykroyd, and in French by Quebec explorer and mountaineer Bernard Voyer. Joyce travelled to Kingston, Ont., to work with Aykroyd in a studio run by Tragically Hip drummer Johnny Fay. Joyce noted Aykroyd, who also starred in the movie The Arrow, portraying the making of Canada's famed fighter jet, was fully behind the A Nation Soars trilogy from the get go.

"He showed up at the studio with Lattes and snacks for everyone; he was extremely eager to work on the project and we hit it off right away," said Joyce. "Mr. Voyer was also an amazing individual who is very committed to teaching. It was so delightful to work with both these people who share the same passion about the importance of Vimy and our First World War aviators."

Their passion is also shared by the pilots of Vimy Flight who will participate in the ceremonial fly-over on April 9, and showcase the two static display Sopwith Pups throughout the Vimy 100 week-long celebrations

One of the pilots flying high above Vimy Ridge will be Comox Valley resident Major (Retired) Dale Erhart, who will be the Vimy Flight Team Leader. Erhart enjoyed a 28-year military career as a pilot and flight instructor and credits the collaboration between Vimy Flight, *A Nation Soars*, Veterans Affairs Canada, and the Royal Canadian Air Force (RCAF) for helping their dream take flight.

"He [Joyce] raised the level of professional credibility to our group through his efforts to involve various levels of government in the project," said Erhart. "It was a big story that we wanted to tell and I can't imagine anyone doing a better job than Mr. Joyce."

Both Joyce and Erhart said Vimy Flight would not have been possible without out the assistance of Veterans Affairs Canada, who helped facilitate the transport of the seven planes to France via a Royal Canadian Air Force CC-177 Globemaster plane March 15.

The planes are now in Lillie, France, ready to take flight for history and film.

Bay Street Armoury on display Then and Now theme

Military Reserve units of Vancouver Island will cap off tributes to the 100th Anniversary of The Battle Vimy Ridge with an April 9 open house at the historic Bay Street Armoury.

The Open House runs 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. and is free to the public. It will pay tribute to the Island's reserve units: The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) and the 5th (BC) Field Regiment Royal Canadian Artillery, 11 (Victoria) Field Ambulance, 39 Service Battalion, and 39 Signal Regiment, plus local cadet units.

LCol Stephen Sawyer, Vimy 100 Open House Co-Chair and Commanding Officer Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's), says the event is familythemed and helps the Canadian Armed Forces educate and build stronger ties with the community. down Blanshard Street or Bay Street see our Armoury, which looks like a castle, but nobody really knows what's inside," says LCol Sawyer. "We love having the opportunity to open up the doors and have an open house that commemorates one of the most significant moments in Canadian history. It is an excellent way for reservists on Vancouver Island to connect with the community."

Inspired by a military "Then and Now" theme, the Open House will include displays by military units and over 35 local museums, archives and history and heritage groups, a tea party featuring costumes and dress of the day, demonstrations, and performances from three military bands, and other musicians taking part in commemorative music programs throughout the day.

At 12:30 p.m., there will be a brief ceremony for the

> "Our event really speaks to the major impact the First World War and the Battle of Vimy Ridge had on the entire community in Victoria," said John Azar, Open House co-chair and historian. "During the war, any individual who lived in Victoria either had a family member fighting in the war or knew someone that was there."

LCol Sawyer also noted the weekend-long Vimy 100 observations are of special significance to the Canadian Scottish Regiment because they are the only regiment on Vancouver Island to wear Vimy Battle Honours on their uniforms, and also because one of their own, Private William Johnstone Milne (1892 to 1917). earned the Victoria Cross for his bravery at Vimy and is one of four First World War Victoria Cross recipients in the regiment.

The Open House will conclude a busy weekend for the approximately 50 reservists from Victoria, Nanaimo and Comox that make up the regiments with a Freedom of the City April 8 at City Hall followed by a march to the Cenotaph and Legislature grounds. The military tradition dates back to Roman times when highly decorated military regiments approached the walls of a city and ask permission to enter and march its streets. It was last performed by the regiment during its 100th anniversary in 2012.

Later that day, during Park's Canada's "A Salute to Vimy 100" at Fort Rodd Hill, members of the 5th Field Regiment will perform a 100-round rapid fire artillery salute paying tribute to soldiers who died while fighting for Canada at The Battle of Vimy Ridge.

Amputees find inspiration from Vimy battle survivors

War Amps

The Battle of Vimy Ridge may have been 100 years ago, but it continues to have modern-day lessons for amputees like Rob Larman and Tiffany Ross of Toronto.

Larman, who lost his leg at the age of 14 when friends dared him to jump a train, now directs The War Amps PLAYSAFE Program, while Tiffany Ross, 10, was born a left arm amputee and is now a member of the The War Amps Child Amputee (CHAMP) Program.

To mark the Vimy anniversary, they laid a rose at the grave of Ethelbert "Curley" Christian at Toronto's Prospect Cemetery, in honour of the remarkable sacrifice Christian made at Vimy that continues to inspire young amputes today.

Christian lost all four limbs in the Vimy Battle and is believed to be the only quadruple amputee to have survived the First World War. Despite his grievous injuries, he became a leading member of the newly established War Amputations of Canada and even returned to the battlefield for the dedication of the Vimy Memorial in 1936.

"Curley Christian passed away in 1954, but he continues to have a legendary status in The War Amps for how he overcame his amputations, particularly at a time when disability was very much a hidden and taboo subject," says Larman.

He adds that laying a rose at Christian's grave on behalf of The War Amps is both a way to honour him as a tremendous role model for amputees, and to put a face to the many Canadian soldiers who lost limbs at Vimy Ridge.

"These young men showed great bravery, both in fighting for their country and in re-adjusting to their new lives as amputees," said Larman. "Through The War Amps, we will continue the work and the example left by amputee veterans such as Curley going long into the future."

Sailor turns needle phobia into remarkable donar legacy

One of the most generous givers of blood admits he cringes each time he sees a needle being cocked to penetrate his flesh, and that he doesn't like the sight of his own blood.

But that hasn't stopped LS William Hull, a 50-year-old Naval Communicator with Base Information Services, from rolling up his sleeve and offering up a pint. On April 10, at the Chiefs' and Petty Officers' Mess, he will make his 474th donation to the Canadian Blood Services.

"I totally hate it, every single time the needle goes in I look away and grit my teeth." he says. "But I realize every time I give blood I am getting the chance to help someone, to save their life, or give them badly needed medical attention."

To give blood many people need to overcome needle phobia. LS Hull vividly remembers the first time he gave blood in 1984; he was 18 years old at the Canadian Red Cross on Wicklow Street in St. John's, Nfld.

"The first time is always the most anxious," he says. "It can be overcome, and like many things inhibiting our dreams and aspirations in life it's all about overcoming your fear and realizing the good that will come out of your action."

Following that turning point, LS Hull has made 209 White Blood Donations, the traditional way of donating a pint of blood containing red blood cells, white blood cells, platelets and plasma at one time, and 264 Platelet Donations, a procedure that produces blood transfusions beneficial to cancer patients. Patricia Willms, Canadian Blood Services Event

Coordinator, characterizes LS Hull's donation tally as "an amazing legacy of dedication", while Territory Manager Ann Chabert describe donation No. 474 as a "huge milestone."

Others, including BIS Branch Petty Officer, CPO1 Darrel Downey also marvel at the sailor's efforts.

"LS Hull has demonstrated exceptional commitment to Canadian Blood Services. Our ability to give life as donors is wonderful, but to donate as often as LS Hull has over the past 32 years is absolutely remarkable; a true testament to his unselfish nature."

That generous spirit is also evident in his spare time when he volunteers for the Canadian Cancer Society, and the Victoria Fish and Game Protective Association as a RSO and safety orientation officer. LS Hull also donates money to the Salvation Army's annual Christmas drive, and organizes Poker Nights at the Fleet Club.

This proud Newfoundlander grew up in Conception Bay South, located approximately 30 kilometres west of St. John's,

Peddling for PTSD - cyclists saddle up

A team of 20 Victoriabased cyclists are supporting Wounded Warriors Canada with an April 9 Spin-O-Thon. The stationary ride fundraiser is part of the larger Wounded Warriors' Battlefield Bike Ride from June 9 to 17, which will take the cyclists on a tour of Europe's famous First World War battle sites. But before their trip

raise \$4,000 each in support of the non-profit organization that assists former and current soldiers and emergency service workers suffering from Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and operational stress injuries.

The Spin-O-Thon runs from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. at the Uptown Shopping Centre's Central Plaza. Taking turns, cyclists will keep their stationary wheels spinning for eight hours while counting on the goodwill of shoppers and passers-by to help

them meet their

fundraising target. Spin-O-Thon organizer Captain Jacqueline Zweng says the monies raised for this fundraising initiative go directly to Wounded Warriors Canada; the riders pay for the costs of their cycling tour.

This year's Battlefield Bike Ride will involve 150 military and civilian cyclists from across Canada converging for a

600-kilometre cycling tour through some of France and Belgium's most famous battlefields, including Flanders Fields, The Somme, and Ypres Salient, with the conclusion at Vimy Ridge.

Capt Zweng says most of the riders on her team, including herself, have a personal stake in making sure Wounded Warriors is supported in their mission.

"PTSD and mental illness effects every single person in the military in some form, and the first responder's community," she says. "Everyone can relate to the issues of depression, anxiety or know someone who is suffering."

For her a diagnoses of breast cancer, and subsequent treatment, brought about some tough days. Before her diagnosis she planned to cycle the 2016 Battle Field Bike Ride along Italy's Adriatic Coast, but her health issues forced her to cancel.

Five days following her partial mastectomy and the removal of three lymph nodes for a biopsy she was involved in a car accident. She suffered impact injuries from a seatbelt in the same area on her chest.

She has since overcome her injuries. She did her last round of chemotherapy March 26. Although Capt Zweng has not been diagnosed with PTSD she says her recent experiences helped her see the light on the important work being done by Wounded Warriors.

"I was able to recognize right away that I had a problem with my own mental health and sought help through counselling," says Capt Zweng. "So after I found out about Wounded Warriors I quickly came a big supporter."

She was one of six runners who recently completed the Wounded Warrior Run B.C., a 700-kilometre trek covering the length of Vancouver Island.

Before slipping from B2, the ship's company welcomed many new faces, some attach posted in, others freshly off course.

For many, the sail represents "their first big trip"; for others, it is the longest they've been away from home, be it Esquimalt, Ottawa, Halifax, or farther afield. Yet, for other sailors and their families the deployment is simply another sail – they've done this before.

LS Chris Johnson's wife, Salsa, is going to pass the time taking cooking classes and volunteering in the Indonesian community, and another navy wife, Wendy, said it will be difficult to have her husband PO2 Romeo Renderos gone – missing birthdays, graduations, and being absent while their children develop.

Whenever *Winnipeg* sails, the crew has the privilege of being focused on the mission, having tasks to help build out routine or planning events in foreign for ports. However, for families ashore, it is difficult to be separated from loved ones and to revert to a different routine once a sailor returns home.

For some *Winnipeg's* sailors the deployment represents their first days at sea; for others it is just another day at the office. Regardless of each crew member's journey, as *Winnipeg* sailed out of Esquimalt Harbour, their loved ones left excited and proud, and ready to manage the home front.
